



We live on a planet that is always here, always present. It can never be absent, or there. Thank goodness or there would be no life!



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## In Clarens ingeweef

As jy 'n opsomming van Clarens se geskiedenis wil hê, het 'n mens net twee name nodig. Minnie di Mezza en Gertie de Jager. Die De Jager-susters van die komberswinkel, "The Blanket Shop" het Clarens in hulle murg, vertel Amanda van Blerk met fotos deur Lorraine Aucamp.

Die winkel is die oudste besigheid in die dorp en die eienaars woon hul lewe lank al hier. Minnie se kinders, Carlo en Sarah, het ook hier grootgeword en Carlo se kinders geniet vandag die ruimte, rustigheid en natuurskoon wat Clarens so besonders maak.

Tydens ons besoek aan die komberswinkel gesels die twee heerlik terwyl hulle klante help en voorraad uitpak. Gemoedelikheid en tevredenheid straal uit hul menswees. Hulle ken die dorp en al die ou geskiedenis. Hulle het mos hier grootgeword van net na die uitspanning voor hul winkel se deur gemaak is. Daar waar die ossewaens op pad Bethlehem toe uitgespan het om die diere blaaskans te gee.



Oom Carel de Jager het die besigheid in 1946 begin maar was reeds voor dit al 'n alombekende besigheidsman. Selfs voordat hy die besigheid begin het, was hy 'n bekende gesig op die plase in die distrik. Hy het met donkiekar sy rondgaande besigheid bedryf en eers later 'n trok aangeskaf om die nodige te doen. In al die geskrifte wat ek my hande op kon lê, noem hulle oom Carel as besigheidsbrein van formaat.

Sy dogters het by hom geleer. Minnie vertel hoe ingewikkeld die destydse merkstelsel was. Die kosprys in kode, 'n datum en verkoopsprys moes op alle items verskyn en deeglik geboekstaaf word. Hoe die goed met die spoorwegbus aangekarwei moes word. Sy vertel van die verteenwoordigers wat daar aangedoen

het -tot tien op 'n dag. Vandag is dit anders en makliker en het hulle in pas van die moderne tegnologie gebly. Maar die winkel is en sal altyd 'n hoogtepunt wees omdat dit uit oud en nuut saamgestel is tot 'n uniekheid wat min hulle kan nadoen.

Hulle het albei hul skoolloopbaan in Clarens begin en later in Bethlehem klaargemaak. Hulle vriende was die mense wat Clarens help vorm het en Minnie noem hulle: Van Zyl, Van Eeden, Liddell, Mousley, Roos en Steyn. Die name van die strate van Clarens, dit is ons mense.

Toeriste van Johannesburg kom die winkeltjie binne en hul word hartlik ingenooi. Duidelik is dit nie hulle eerste besoek nie en ken hulle die pad om die outydse toonbanke in na die hart van die komberskoninkryk. Komberse is in bonte verskeidenheid opgestapel tot teen die dak, maar onnodige voorraad is daar nie. Die susters ken hulle komberse en weet wat hul klante wil hê. Of dit nou toeriste van Gauteng; plaaslike klandisie of komberskopers uit Lesotho is. Hier kry jy jou kombers wat knus om jou skouers of knieë sal pas.

Sonder hierdie twee komberskenners kan Clarens nie eers probeer om Fees te hou nie. Nadat al die galerye deurgestap is en nadat al die restaurante besoek is, en nadat al die mense musiek gemaak het, as jy nie in die komberswinkel was nie, het jy nie die fees bygewoon nie.





## The art festival's feminine side

#### Tina de Beer

Being an artist in Clarens is not easy. It takes hard work and masterly skill to fulfil the urge to paint the beauty that surrounds not only Clarens, but the Eastern Free State. Tina de Beer is a master of her trade. She loves painting the Eastern Free State countryside and these paintings never hang in the gallery for long.

Tina paints mostly in oils. Her childhood mentor N.H. Brettell taught her how to interpret what she sees and introduced her to the principals and the materials of art. She enjoys painting with oils because of the wetness of its texture and she believes she can do anything with it. But versatility allows her to also paint in watercolours and mixed media.

Painting is the primary force in her daily life and Tina learned and practised art for a long time before she considered her work to be art. Today, art to Tina de Beer is the culmination of her life experiences. She gratefully celebrates her talent and refuses to mass produce her work.

Commissions are undertaken, within her own style and she is well known for the extreme effort she puts in to satisfy her clients' requirements, be it buck from the Kruger National Park or a wheat land in the Free State.

Clarens is hosting a visual Arts Festival from 7 to 9 October and there sure will be many paintings, as well as pottery and other crafts produced by as many different artists on exhibition. Marchelle, however, is a picture all of her own, as well as an accomplished violinist who will be performing at the Festival. There certainly will be other musicians too such as Rooibaardt and the choirs of Kgubetswana with the team of the Working on Fire at the forefront, but Marchelle is Clarens's own singing violinist.

Marchelle performed at the media launch of the Festival and she rendered many well-known songs from yesteryear and some more recent hits. She played works of Mozart and switched to jazz with the same ease of voice and cord. Her sweet voice carried to the corners of the building and visitors to the launch at Addy Hoyle Gallery, tapped and swayed to the clear sounds. What could have been just another Wednesday afternoon was transformed into a contagiously joyous and festive occasion that lasted much longer than the afternoon. Visitors to the launch enjoyed wine and snacks, together wil paintings and speeches -but most of all and beyond the small talk and laughter, there was Marchelle's voice entertaining in the background.









#### Artists of Kgubetswana

Sam Tshabalala and Morgan are born and raised in Kgubetswana, Clarens. They went to school here and know the area like the back of their hands. They know where to go to find the best pictures to put to canvas. Both are enchanted with the beauty of their home town and succeed in communicating this adoration to the viewer.

Compared to other artists painting in and around Clarens, they are inexperienced but use their energetic youth to their advantage. They often visit cosy little corners in the countryside to paint their realistic pictures. They don't shoot photos and paint at home; no, they will take their easels and start early on a trek up the mountain side or out of town to be able to finish the framework before the day fades. Afterwards they will then easily change a scene to fit in with their idea of what visitors to Clarens will want to see.

Morgan is very proud of his painting which could have been dubbed the "Clarens Welcome".

"These walls are imaginary and so is the inscription 'Welcome to Clarens'," he smiled. "But these sandstone cliffs are near the Maluti Lodge. They are real enough."

Sam is not as forthcoming with information as to where he found the scenes that lead to his classical portrayal of the countryside. It is everywhere and not in one place only, was all he was prepared to divulge. He uses mainly soft pastels to portray the marvellous landscapes that make Clarens the special place it is.


These two young artists are exhibiting at the Clarens Art and Info Centre just off the square.



#### Ric the Sculptor

He lives art and handles nature with care. He sources wood in the veld and polishes it to its natural lustre. Glass and silver take on a new life in his hands. Walking the fields, Ric finds pieces of wood and combines them with glass to create magical and mysterious objects of art. And he refuses to be called an artist. He is just an instrument for art to happen and the joy of a finished staff or glass pyramid with its triangles reflecting the pureness of light is reward enough.

#### Karla van den Bergh

Karla van den Bergh has many virtues, one of which is painting very realistic, brightly coloured and exceedingly beautiful paintings of various subjects. Her paintings consist of clearly defined lines, realistic colours and abbreviated and punctuated life on canvass. From those clear lines and dramatic reds one can only assume that the artist is an extrovert. She would have to be to courageously, almost arrogantly, apply bombastic red paint contrasted with black lines in which a story is so clearly told.

And yet, with feminine touch, she also combines beige and rosy pink flowers on an enormous canvas and lets the viewer in on a little secret that is a secret no longer, only to swing round and happily paint a simple scene that defines the emotion of a life lived unstintingly.

In evaluating Karla van den Bergh's work, there is a clear line drawn by life itself. Her painted figures let you believe that they are real and in a perpetual beginning of an end. No mystique here, only life's little dramas and indulgences of real life paintings. But she looks at her collection and smilingly calls it art on a positive note. Positive yes – ironic too – but mainly beautiful art.

Louise Barton's road came full circle when she settled in Clarens some two months ago. As a maternal descendant of the well-known Commandant Fick after whom Ficksburg was named, life took her on many highways and byways, to foreign shores that became her homeland, but she returned to her roots. Maybe unintentionally, but to her roots all the same.

She excels in watercolours but Louise enjoys other mediums too; she loves nature and focuses on the beauty that surrounds her, whether here in the Eastern Free State or elsewhere. A certain scene will grab her and lead her to the easel. She will mix and adjust to her satisfaction, and the end result is an eye pleaser and outstanding work.

Growing up in Zimbabwe and being friends with renowned Richard Rennie, who taught her the inside-outs of painting and artistry, it was almost a natural conclusion that she would be settling in Clarens. After attending many of Richard Rennies workshops at the guest farm Sunnyside and at Richard's studio a block away from her new little gallery next to the Protea Hotel, she is now proudly Clarens.

Ná skool het Andries alias Caveman op een van die familieplase gaan boer, soos sy ander broers. Hy sou seker 'n normale lewe gelei

het as dit nie vir die gebeure van Oktober 1929 was nie. Dit het sy lewe verander en op die ou end van hom 'n internasionale sportman en 'n baie bekende persoonlikheid gemaak, skryf Leon Strachan in die tweede deel oor Caveman Spies.

Vroeg een oggend daardie lente, het sy buurman op Diepsloot by hom aangekom en hom die ding vertel. \* Andries was blykbaar so ontsteld dat hy 'n tas gepak en van die plaas af weggestap het; sonder om sy voordeur te sluit, of reëlings te tref vir die versorging van sy vee of hantering van die oeste op die land.

2 JAN 5

Binne 'n jaar hierna het hy in meer lande professioneel geveg as wat die gemiddelde bokser in 'n hele loopbaan doen. En hy sou eers weer tien jaar later terug wees op die plaas.

Vroeg in 1930 het hy 'n paar kleinerige gevegte in Johannesburg en in Durban gehad. Hy het glo sy opponente voor die voet uitgeslaan – Andries het begin slaan as die klok lui en nie opgehou totdat die teenstaander op die vloer bly lê nie. Aan verdediging het hy hom blykbaar nie veel gesteur nie, en dis daardie woeste, opwindende manier van veg wat hom sy bynaam besorg het. Na 'n geveg by die Seemansinstituut in Durban, waar hy gereeld geveg het, het 'n Engelse predikant, Miles Cadman, hom Caveman gedoop. 'n Naam wat hom lewenslank sou bybly en hom veral goed in sy stoeiloopbaan te pas sou kom.

Sy gebrek aan verdediging in die kryt sou hom egter later in sy lewe baie duur te staan kom want hy het te veel houe geabsorbeer. As Andries net 'n uitgeslape bestuurder kon gehad het wat sy loopbaan opgebou het voordat hy teen beter opponente losgelaat is, kon hy werklik groot roem behaal het.


Maar met Andries se onafhanklikheid en hardkoppigheid was daar nie sulke moontlikhede nie. Hy was 'n ekstrovert en adrenalien-junkie en het hom nie veel aan ander se opinies gesteur nie. Geld was ook nie vir hom belangrik nie, wat hom in 'n sekere sin roekeloos en onverantwoordelik gemaak het.

So is hy dan sonder 'n promotor, afrigter of bestuurder Engeland toe. Hy het 'n tussendekkaartjie op 'n skip gekoop en is met net £10 in sy sak en 'n ekstra stel kakieklere weg. Vir sy legendariese krag was Andries eintlik verbasend klein. Hy was ongeveer 5' 10" lank, maar het sterk voorarms en groot hande gehad, en vingers wat soos trosse piesangs aan sy hande gehang het. In gewone klere het hy glad nie buitengewoon gelyk nie want hy was geensins uitermate gespierd nie. Sy verbloemde krag het hy meesal tot sy voordeel gebruik.

In sy eerste geveg in Engeland het hy sy opponent met net een woeste hou uitgeslaan. Omdat hy nie groot of vreeslik gespierd was nie, is hy gewoonlik onderskat, voordat sy reputasie hom vooruit geloop het. Hy kon dus nog 'n hele klompie opponente uitknikker voordat voornemende vegters opgeraak het. Toe is hy oor die Engelse Kanaal vasteland toe.

In Stockholm was daar 'n relletjie wat baie tipies aan hom was. Die taal was 'n bietjie van 'n probleem. 'n Skeidsregter het die geveg teen Anders Anderson na die derde ronde probeer stop oor Anderson op sy voete uit was. Spies kon nie verstaan wat aangaan nie, want die man staan dan nog. Maar toe die skeidsregter aan hom pluk om sy boodskap deur te kry, vererg Caveman hom. Toe slaan hy sommer dié ook uit. Van die toeskouers en beamptes takel hom toe, maar hulle het ook vir Spies onderskat. Hy het glo by die hotel aangekom net in sy boksbroek en bokshandskoene.

"Sonder die Andries Spies-legendes sou die Oos-Vrystaat ongetwyfeld veel armer gewees het. En as Andries se buurman nie daardie noodlottige oggend so onverwags op Diepsloot aangekom het nie, sou hy miskien net 'n baie interessante boer gebly het. Na koffie het die buurman glo ongemaklik op 'n riempiestoel rondgeskuif en toe vir Andries die nuus gegee dat sy (Andries se) verloofde stilletjies met 'n vriend van hom getroud is en die hasepad gevat het. Die twee was glo te bang vir die gevolge as die sterke derduiwel van die verhouding sou te hore kom."























## They set sail in the mountains

After many fruitless attempts to contact Mr Webster, InClarens decided to publish this wonderful story that allegedly played out in QwaQwa in the Eastern Free State. It was first published by Sunday Times in September 2009.

## The Homeward Bound

Roger Webster looks at the settlers who didn't want to stay

With the end of the Zulu war in 1880, plenty of immigrants from all over the globe started coming to what was then Natal - including a group of Norwegians lured to South Africa by glowing reports from the master of a Norwegian mission ship.

Until then, according to the Norwegian Settlers Association, Norwegians had been settling in large numbers in America, but in July 1883 a group arrived at the Marburg Mission Station, on the hills outside present-day Port Shepstone.

Unfortunately, there was a terrible depression during the 1880s and Natal was severely hit, to such an extent that even the newly established local shipping service between Port Shepstone and Port Natal had been curtailed and many immigrants were being forced out of their new homes to seek opportunities further afield.

Three such unfortunates were the Norwegians Inguald Nilsen, his brother Bernhard and one Zefanius Oslen. The seamen, who had all the skills necessary to repair ships, started to wander up the coast, finding odd jobs wherever they could.

Their luck hadn't changed by the time they reached Durban, so the trio decided to turn inland towards the newly settled and developed farms in the Drakensberg area, which were in great need of skilled workers.

The trio eventually reached the mountainous Witsieshoek area (now Phuthaditjhaba) of the Orange Free State Republic.

There, in this most beautiful part of our country, they all found jobs.

Just imagine the journey: Marburg, Durban, Witsieshoek ... over 400km all on foot!

Initially, the Norwegians enjoyed the work and the climate, but their homesickness soon began to grow.

They were all skilled in ship-building and, as they were seafarers by trade, the three eventually decided to build a ship and sail home. But they didn't head back to the coast to start the work: like Robinson Crusoe, they built the ship where they were living at the time, designing a 4¾ ton vessel 6m long and just over 2m wide.

Whenever they had spare time, the three logged local timber, cutting and drying it, slowly accumulating all the necessary material and equipment and then starting on the carpentry work.

The ship took over two years to complete and they christened her "The Homeward Bound". In January 1886, she was ready to start her long, downhill trip to Durban.

Imagine the scene in the mountains!

The Nilsen brothers and Oslen lashed "The Homeward Bound" to a long, wheel-based commissariat wagon - pulled by a full span of oxen - and said their farewells to the local farmers, who had all come to see this amazing event. Never had anybody even dreamt of such a feat, let alone witnessed it.

Two months later, at the end of February 1886, the wagon bearing "The Homeward Bound" arrived in Durban. The townsfolk were astonished: this was the first seaworthy vessel ever to come out of the Free State. When they heard that it was going to set sail for Norway, they were dumbfounded. After many parties and much pomp and ceremony, on May 2 1886 "The Homeward Bound" bade farewell to the thousands gathered on the Durban quayside, and sailed off towards Cape Town.

The local papers were full of the story, and the news spread nationally and then internationally: "The Homeward Bound" and her crew had become celebrities.

Her passage was watched with intense interest and curiosity by people all over the world. Her every move was



charted and watched, as all passing ships had instructions to report on her progress.

The voyage was extremely hazardous for, being a small craft, "The Homeward Bound" had to hug the shoreline most of the time. When bad weather threatened, she would anchor in a suitable bay along the coast to wait out the storm. Spotting her became a favourite pastime along the South African coast and, wherever she docked, the townsfolk would treat her sailors as heroes, and refuse to accept payment for food or supplies.

Then the long haul started: Cape Town to England. The world held its breath.

On March 20 1887, a full 10 months after setting sail from Durban, "The Homeward Bound" arrived safely in the English Channel.

To the salutes of harbour tugs, the tumultuous, blaring welcome of every ship's foghorn, and a full military parade with band playing, the tiny craft was escorted into Dover harbour. The crowd lining the pier went mad with excitement as the world smiled and sighed in relief.






The men were the toast of London. They were entertained by royalty and Queen Victoria even bought the tiny craft and put it on display at Crystal Palace.

The sale of the "Homeward Bound", plus a generous amount paid to the men for public talks and appearances, ensured that Oslen and the Nilsen brothers enjoyed first-class travel back home to their beloved Norway where they were feted as heroes.

And so, three brave new settlers to South Africa, from faraway Witsieshoek in a little corner of our beloved country, slipped from the stage of international fame, never to be heard of again.





Van Eeden is not a common name to come across in the USA and I read the article with growing admiration for a young rural girl who excelled and made her mark in the faraway state of California.

'Choc Children at Mission Hospital's newest Golden Paw of the Quarter, Marion van Eeden, a clinical nurse in the Paediatrics unit, travelled a long way to be a nurse at CCMH. Originally a nurse in South Africa, she became interested in being a paediatric nurse in the US.'

The article continues with how Marion finally became part of the team at this Californian hospital and concludes: 'Without a doubt, the staff and the patients at CCMH are lucky to have her on their team.' The last sentence of the article is really heart—warming. 'She also speaks two languages from her native country—Afrikaans and Sotho.'



#### For the love of animals... and of food

When you pick up a puppy from the warmth of its mother and you bury your face in its soft pelt or look into its startled eyes and feel its heart beat rapidly in your hand and with soft strokes over its head you try to calm its fear for the unknown, you know there are other puppies and animals that are not as fortunate as this one settling in your lap. If you have never felt these tender emotions towards any animal, you need not read any further. But most of us at some point experienced the softness of a young animal and the protective feeling it evoked.

In many instances in the townships there simply isn't the means to properly care for a family let alone a bitch with 10-15 pups or a mule that has to carry a bag of meal into the mountains.

Dr Kathrine Barker veterinary practitioner in Fouriesburg and Clarens, saw many neglected animals across the Eastern Free State and an independent, non-governmental veterinary welfare organisation (trust) was formed in February 2011. This stemmed from the sterilisation programme she established in 2004. The Cluny trust, with Heather Pieterse as liaison, serves the needs of animals owned by impoverished residents.

On 17 September, Cook for Cluny was held on Clarens square to raise funds. It was a festive occasion and went along with much laughter and serious cooking. Winners and losers were irrelevant, although the winning team received the Cluny Animal Trust floating trophy which will be kept at Kathrin Barker's veterinary surgery in Clarens.

The cooks competed and judging was taken care of by Mandy Prior and speaker of Dihlabeng Angie Noosi. Roy Jankielsohn opened proceedings and cooking started in all earnest.

Clarens restaurants and individuals were well represented by Walter Siviter and Ric Fry (Grouse and Claret); Simon Kerr (Phat Chef); Duncan (278 on Main); and a team of the Protea Hotel. A team from a local estate agency lead by Gordon Jefferys joined, and so did Anne-mari (Yoga instructor) and Gert de Lange with a vegetarian potjie; Katherine Barker and Malcolm Woolmore; Johann Lehman and Les Thake; and Bernie and Eve Platte with Judith Frost. In the end it was the Eish Team that took top honours.

### Noughts and crosses

A few years ago Anél Lehman needed hands to help out at the Golf and Trout Villas which were booked to capacity. She sent word with one of her staff members that there would be job opportunities for a few persons but when about 50 jobseekers turned up the next day, she knew straightaway what the real need in Clarens was.

She discussed with her husband this state of joblessness in Clarens and the very next week her plan gained momentum. Sewing machines were acquired. Anél taught the women of Kgubetswana how to sew and they started making quilts. Crossword puzzle patterns and no intricate designs -like chequered chess boards. Quilt after quilt rolled from under the sewing machine needles. Since they started, they have never been able to keep up with the demand.

"If I can get hold of more second-hand sewing machines, I can do more," says Anél, "I cannot buy new sewing machines to teach the unskilled; I need sturdy second-hand ones that can last another five or six years. As soon as they are skilled, I can give them the more sophisticated machines."

Because the designs of these quilts at Clarens Interiors are not as intricate as those of American origin and because they are constructed by Africans, the seamstresses like to refer to them as African designed quilts. The combination of texture and colour play a larger role here than small and detailed patterns

resulting in a much more modern version of bedding quilts.

These African quilts are on display at Clarens Interiors, Anél's shop on the square and that is where browsing visitors and locals can see and buy handmade, self-designed quilts.

"When visiting the shop, they see the finished product and they can consider the price and budget, there and then. No hidden extras between estimation lines or added costs of an interior designer.

With the simple and plain design they can tie together an entire colour scheme of any bedroom in one quilt, each square representing the colour combinations of the bedroom.

Down filling is on the cards too at Clarens Interiors and lightweight easily cleanable fabric is used to cover cushions and pillows in almost any size and shape. You order those, they do not stock and while you browse the shop, the ladies will sew it all together and you leave with a cushion, napkin or even table cloth to your satisfaction.
