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
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

InClarens is.....

Autumn is a wonderful time for family and friends to gather and admire the golden shower of autumn leafs in the Eastern Free State and see the sun go down behind those illustrious sandstone cliffs. The autumn climate in Clarens and surrounds is unsurpassed and InClarens celebrates autumn with sandstone stories, courageous trekking and art of the varied kind.

Sandstone certainly is the backbone of the Eastern Free State and specifically Clarens sandstone.

There has been resurgence in the popularity of dressed sandstone blocks, for use in walls, edging and retaining walls in South Africa and this material is currently being imported from Lesotho. Small quarries were established near Ladybrand and Ficksburg in the eastern Free State in the early 1900s to supply stone for local buildings but the first stone used to build in Clarens, was quarried from nearby hills and sandstone koppies. Buff coloured, finegrained and well-sorted aeolian sandstone of the Clarens Formation, Karoo Supergroup, forms prominent cliffs and ridges in the Eastern Free State and well-used building material in the 1900s. But there is not much information available about the beautiful sandstone buildings of Clarens. InClarens reports on some of the historic buildings and of the man who knew how to mine and dress sandstone to perfection.


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## Allan Wilberforce Turton 1918 ~ 1991

'To do justice to the distinction and stature of master portrait painter Allan Turton FRSA (Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts) in a short article like this is almost impossible. We may at most obtain a brief but clear glimpse into his noble character and calling.'

With the consent of his great-niece Ms Lisa Pike of Pretoria, we are privileged to show you a number of prime examples of his portraits and suggest that by looking deeply into the eyes and faces, one may find an uncommon authentic realism – so fascinating one is moved to stare! And when we hear that someone such as he had been so inspired that he devoted his twilight years' time and energy to the Little Caledon River Valley, we are filled with an affectionate respect, writes Peter Howard.



Born at Dundee in Natal Allan grew up among the green hills of the countryside and from an early age possessed an acute artistic perceptiveness. His musical prowess was such that he could have become a concert pianist should he have wished, but he showed promise of becoming an artist of consequence. Driven by his completely natural talent – raw skill might be nearer the truth – superb paintings and sketches appeared on his easel. It was evident, however, that his excellence might one day lie in portraiture.

At university he was encouraged to develop this passion and from 1940-44 he studied at the University of Natal under Professor O.J.P. Oxley and Ms Rosa Hope. In 1949, he held the first of five solo art exhibitions in Pietermaritzburg but an artist's life is seldom filled with merited remuneration and permanent employment followed. From 1955-69 Allan worked as the art master at Durban High School. During this period, he was granted sabbatical leave to undergo private tuition in the UK by Edward Halliday, renowned member of the Royal Society of Portrait Painters. In 1970, Allan was

elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and from 1970-74 he was appointed the art lecturer at Edgewood College of Education in Pinetown.


Allan Turton's artistic reputation and expertise now became better known and he was regularly commissioned to paint portraits of dignitaries from Durban High School and the Church of England; chancellors and vice-chancellors of universities such as Natal, Rhodes and Bophuthatswana, as well as a number of large Not unexpectedly being corporations. something of a genius and perhaps eccentric, he was not one for being hassled or hurried and people soon found that the odd official portrait could take months to complete. On the other hand, despite his artistic traits he was quiet and reserved, really a most likeable personality who would willingly do portraits of selected private individuals without being paid for it.

His first of many visits to Sunnyside Guest Farm in the Clarens district took place in 1960 when an immediate lasting attachment was formed. "It is a place of remarkable tranquillity and beauty and has had an important influence on my life," he is quoted as saying. So when fourteen years later, a threatened detached retina in one of his eyes caused premature retirement it was to his own home at Sunnyside that he moved. Life changing it was for him, as he was now able to do the things he loved doing.

For relaxation, he enjoyed playing his Broadwood Grand Piano in his thatched cottage and haunting strains from Beethoven, Bach or Scarlatti would often drift through the stately oaks and poplars, the music regaling the ears of many a fortunate holiday-maker strolling by.


At first appearance, Allan was probably only recognised as an exceptional portrait painter but there was far more to the man than this. An especially well-balanced personality, refinement and artistic skills were accompanied by tremendous humanism, an eye to the future and the need for energetic social and cultural upliftment of those often forgotten people who crossed his path. Allan took upon himself the task of voluntary teaching and financing black youngsters on the farm and in Lesotho.







## The evidence remained







Different reasons are given for the disappearance of dinosaurs from the planet, but if you believe the latest research, which postulates that birds are evolved dinosaurs, then they've never actually left the planet. The interesting question remains as to what happened aeons again the Clarens region, an area that is so rich in the remains of plant and animal fossils?

Wim Wybenga, investigated.

An unusual turn of events about 200 million years past led to a change in the supply of water to this area, but it was not related to climate change. The nearest coast was 3 000km away, and for a period of about 80 million years, the region rarely received any rain, although it had a seasonal supply of water.

Massive mountain ranges occurred at present-day East London, due to the collision of the Antarctic sub-continent with the African section of Gondwanaland. It had an altitude in excess of 12km (4km higher than Everest), covered with glaciers and ice.

During the summer months, melting ice gave rise to big rivers that fed lakes, marshes and deltas inland, similar in nature to the present-day Okavango Delta in Botswana. The mud deposits from these wetland areas are what we refer to today as the Elliot Formation, brittle red layers, not to be confused, however, with the more sturdy red sandstones, which lie just on top of it - as can be seen in the mushroom rocks at Golden Gate (red and yellowish sandstone layers).

The eventual erosion of these mountain ranges at East-London, led to the absence of precipitation and ice, hence the supply of water to the dry inland region was minimised. Sand from the Kalahari basin blew in and accumulated over millennia, sometimes catching animals off guard. One of the many fossilised dinosaur eggs unearthed at Rooidraai in Golden Gate shows an infant beginning to hatch with the unfortunate surprise of being caught in a sand storm.

During the Spring Fair in Fouriesburg end of last year, a few fortunate visitors made the decision to visit Mafube Mountain Retreat 8km from the town as part of the advertised programme. Apparently a




young visitor discovered a dinosaur track site on the farm in 2010 that turned out to become quite an attraction to this secluded sanctuary. There are about 12 distinct tracks on a sandstone platform, some of them easily 30cm in length. In correspondence with local specialist in the field, Dr Groenewald, the first guess is that they belong to Massospondylus, but closer inspection will be needed to confirm. Massospondyluscarinatus was a herbivore that stood up to 3m tall, its fossilised remains are quite common in the eastern Free State and Lesotho.

Golden Gate Highlands National Park has been in the news recently for the discovery of another set of fossilised Massospondyluseggs at Rooidraai, the first discovery was made by Dr James Kitching in 1977. These eggs are considered to be the oldest fossilised embryos on the planet at an estimated 190 million years old.

Ten nests have been unearthed so far, each with approximately34 eggs in tightly clustered clutches. They are about 7-8cm in diameter. Canadian palaeontologist Prof Robert Reisz (of the University of Toronto), who is heading the team, says there are likely to be many more nests buried in the cliff, overlaid by tons of rock. Prof Bruce Rubidge of the Bernard Price Institute at Wits University, notes that the distribution of the eggs suggests that the dinosaurs probably revisited the same nests over a long period of time to lay their eggs and assembled in groups - referred to as colonial nesting.

In close proximity to the dinosaur track site at Mafube, visitors may also be fortunate to come across the remains of a later-stone age San rock art site. These sites may be visited by appointment only. Book in advance at their retreat (Hillary Monson 084 668 4499).

























in the sandstone



Leon Strachan, a regular contributor to InClarens, reveals some astounding facts and mysteries about the blockhouses of the Anglo Boer War.

One is fascinated by the beautiful sandstone blockhouse guarding the waterworks on the foothills of Platberg, near Harrismith. How could an army at war find the time and put in the effort to build such a magnificent structure? Why weren't those soldier-masons chasing the Boers instead?

Masonry blockhouses were erected at key points during the Anglo Boer War and the Harrismith railway link was without a doubt the most valuable military asset in the whole of the Eastern Free State. The main Durban-Johannesburg line ran through Ladysmith, Newcastle and Volksrust at the time, and still does. A line was branched off to Harrismith in the 1880s, but was never extended until after the war. It stopped dead at Harrismith.

This meant that all troop movements, tens of thousands of horses, and all supplies for the greater Eastern Free State region had to be channelled through Harrismith station. As well as everything going out, naturally: prisoners-of-war to Durban harbour, returning regiments, etc. Troops moving in or out were encamped right around the town, up to 20 000 at times, and all were dependent

During the war, 441 masonry blockhouses were built, and it took 30 engineers 30 days, on average, to cut the stone and construct one at a cost of £900. Although such structures were rather rare, another three were built around Harrismith to protect that precious rail link. One guarded the Oliviershoek road, another the Bethlehem road, and the last the Majoorsdrift road (the only one since completely demolished). These access roads were regarded as the most vulnerable avenues of Boer attack, and were thus rewarded with fortress like sandstone blockhouses. Neither Harrismith, flooded with all those troops, nor the intimidating structures around it, were ever threatened.

It was rather the 'tin' blockhouses, as Kitchener called them, that played a much more significant role in the war – his solution for a huge headache. As the war dragged on, pressure for the successful conclusion of the war from London became unbearable. Kitchener feared dismissal as Boer guerrillas showed no sign of letting up. He resorted to even more desperate measures – expensive and time consuming. The plan now was not only to 'starve them into submission,' but to 'block off their free movement' as well.

The ruthlessly applied 'scorched earth' policy went quite a way towards the starving bit. He now needed to immobilise them, and barbed wire fences would have to do the job. The problem with a fixed military obstacle is that it is useless if not effectively covered by fire. A barbed wire fence had no use at all, if not defended – it could be cut at will. Then Kitchener got an idea. He would use corrugated iron blockhouses to protect the fences. Such blockhouses, designed by Major Rice of the Royal Engineers, had earlier been put to good effect to protect vulnerable railway lines in the Transvaal. Relatively cheap, at £16 each, and around £60 to erect, he ordered thousands.

The trick would be to place them within rifle range of each other, which meant an average 750 yards apart. While accurate fire was impossible at that range, lead could be thrown quite effectively from both ends.

Hard to believe (the man must have driven his engineers ruthlessly) but in a mere fifteen months (January 1901 to March 1902) all of 6 883 of the Ricetype structures were procured, imported and erected, as well as barbed wire fences covering all of a staggering 6 000 kilometres (8 000 blockhouses in all, if the 441 masonry and 555 fixed shelters are counted in).

Continuous lines stretched from Vredenburg on the West Coast to Gaberone in Botswana, another from Queenstown right to Nylstroom; Nelspruit to Pretoria; Newcastle to Mafikeng and from Harrismith (Oliviershoek pass) to Vryburg where it joined up with the Vredenburg-Gaberone line. In between and interconnecting were several shorter lines.

Although quite thick, the corrugated iron did not effectively stop bullet penetration. Dirt or stone, whatever was available, was stacked breast high against the structures to protect the soldiers within. The fence allowed soldiers to set out accurate fields of fire, empty bully beef tins were fastened to it for early warning, and uniforms stuffed with straw used as dummy-guards.

Besides the dummies Kitchener deployed 50 000 troops and 16 000 armed black recruits to man these structures. It was a huge operation, and massively expensive. And a logistic nightmare to feed and supply them – the lines were so long that supply columns weren't properly protected at all times.

The drives Kitchener used to trap the remaining Boers between these guerrilla-catching blockhouse/barbed wire lines were not spectacularly successful.

Did these lines contribute to the wearing down of the Bittereinders? The lines had an undeniably tiring effect on those already discouraged and despondent, but committed Boer Bittereinders like De Wet and Wessels who operated in the Eastern Free State, broke through at will. De Wet dismissed them scornfully as 'blockhead' lines.

Contrary to Kitchener's objective, the blockhouse lines actually prolonged the war. Boers poached on supply convoys to the soldiers who manned the blockhouses for food and ammunition. These were increasingly difficult to come by as Kitchener had effectively dried up their traditional sources of supply.

Kitchener's use of surprise night-attacks in the last stages of the war, and improved British intelligence gathering using black spies, were far more demoralising and effective. Why on earth did he spend so much money and commit so many men on such a useless venture?





## Op sandsteen se spoor

Amanda van Blerk spoor die spoor van Clarens-sandsteen na, en besef dat daar bitter min feitelike inligting is oor die monument-geboue wat van Clarenssandsteen gebou is.

Toe Gert van Zyl van Rayton in Pretoria, my kontak om 'n graf te gaan soek in die Naauwpoortbegraafplaas buite Clarens, het die naam vaagweg bekend gelyk en hoe verder ek aan die brief lees, hoe meer het ek onder die indruk gekom dat Clarens talle ongeëerde helde opgelewer het. Die ou Gert van Zyl was so 'n ongeëerde held, maar sy nalatenskap sal geslagte bly voortbestaan.

Gert vertel dat hy as kind, seker so sestig of meer jaar gelede, skoolvakansies by sy oupa Gert van Zyl, op Clarens kom kuier het. Sy oupa het in Van der Merwestraat gebly en die kinders het hulle dae in die holkrans, nie ver van van der Merwestraat nie, deurgebring.

Die van Zyls het van Ladismith in die Kaap na die Oos-Vrystaat getrek. Iza(a)k Petrus van Zyl en Helena Susanna van Wyk en vier kinders het hulle in die Oos-Vrystaat gevestig.

Hul vierde kind Gert Johannes, getroud met Magdalena du Plessis, gaan boer op 'n plaas aan Bethlehem se kant van die Asrivier, maar na sy gade se dood, laat hy die plaas in die hande van sy seun in ruil vir 'n huis in Clarens. Soos sy kleinseun Gert dit beskryf, was dit baie jare die enigste huis in Van der Merwestraat en die ou Gert het daar gewoon tot met sy dood op 23 Junie 1942 – haas ondenkbaar wanneer 'n mens na die hedendaagse Clarens kyk. Hy word in die Naauwpoort-begraafplaas begrawe.

In al die geskrifte oor die sandsteengeboue, word daar na 'Dowe' Gert verwys. Hy was inderdaad doof nadat die Engelse sy kommando gedurende die Anglo-Boereoorlog oorlog onder kartets gesteek het. Blykbaar is Gert se perd uitmekaar geruk en hoewel hy met sy lewe daarvan afgekom het, het dit hom heeltemal doof gelaat.

Generaal de Wet het hom huis toe gestuur, maar Gert wou tot elke prys iets vir die oorlog beteken. Hy het nie huis toe gegaan nie, maar in die veld gebly en ammunisie gemaak wat hy op plekke in die veld begrawe het en hy het met vuur en rookseine vir sy makkers laat weet waar om dit te kry.

Gert van Zyl sou egter nie onthou word vir sy ammunisievervaardiging tydens die oorlog nie. Sy ware vernuf was klip-kap-en-bouwerk. En hiervoor sal hy onthou word omdat sandsteen rooi in die oggendson gloei. Ware klipmonumente van Gert van Zyl.

In 1921 het eerwaarde Roux van Bethlehem diens gehou in 'n swak gebou in Kgubetswana wat al gevaarlik begin bars het. Die een muur was volgens oogmaat, oor die drie duim uit skietlood. Daar is aanbeveel dat die gebou afgebreek en oorgebou word. Na verskeie kerkraadsvergaderings en baie wik en weeg of die sendingkerk eerste gebou moet word of eers Clarens s'n, word daar besluit dat die behoefte in Kgubetswana dringender is. Eers in Februarie 1936 word P. Steyl se tender aanvaar en die hulp van Gert van Zyl ingeroep om as opsigter waar te neem oor die bouery waarvoor hy, soos dit in die notules aangeteken is, "n ietsie vergoed sou word.'


Die datum, 1936, kom uit ds. Piet Grobler se boek oor Clarens en ek glo hy het die inligting uit die ou kerkraad-notules verkry en kerkraad-notules is 'n helder nagmerrie wanneer na inligting gesoek word en daar kon moontlik 'n fout gemaak gewees het met die datum. Die hoeksteen van die kerk in Kgubetswana lees 1926. 'n Verskil van tien jaar! Of dit nou 'n nuwe hoeksteen vir die nuwe kerk was en of dit die ou kerk se hoeksteen is wat weer gebruik is, kon ek nie uitvind nie. Wat ek wel

uitgevind het, is dat daar maar min bekend is oor Clarens se sandsteen geboue.

Net na die Sendingkerk voltooi is, besluit die Engelssprekende lede van die Clarensgemeenskap dat hulle 'n eie kerk wil bou. Dienste is tot toe op die plase St Fort en Dunblane in die distrik gehou, maar die Liddell-broers het inisiatief geneem, materiaal, arbeid en vervoer verskaf en Gert van Zyl het begin om die klip te breek.

Ná voltooiing van die Metodistekerk en ná fondsinsamelings en basaars, begin Gert van Zyl tydens die uitbreek van die Tweede Wêreldoorlog met die kap van die Clarens NG Kerk se klippe. Die klip is met osse nader gesleep en elkeen in sy eie plekkie ingesink.

Geen sement is gebruik vir die bouwerk nie, maar 'n moddernessie het elke perfek gekapte klip met die ander saamgevoeg tot pragtige eenheid. Bull Face en al! Vandag word masjiene ingespan om klip ewe groot en glad te sny en die ambag word nie meer aangeleer nie – die kuns het helaas uitgesterf.



# Your body's secrets revealed

Gradually this incredible technology has been introduced into South Africa and in the past year it has become a wonderful alternative to the old forms of scanning for the detection of breast disease.


There is no radiation, no trauma to patient and breast, and it can be done in the comfort of your own home. With the camera being able to detect, in the very early stages, any musculoskeletal and neurological problem, this type of scanning for ladies is a huge step forward.

How it works: The thermal camera is set up on a stand; the patient sits comfortably, or stands approximately 2m away from the camera. A trained thermographer then captures thermal images at various angles. These images are stored onto the programmed PC, and relayed to a panel of specialists in the United States, who interpret the thermal patterns. The patient is handed the printed diagnosis approximately two hours later and she can take this to her doctor or physician as she would a standard X-ray.

Any physiological changes that accompany breast pathology like cancer, fibrocystic disease or an infection will be detected with this scanning procedure.

It is well known that mammography detects structural change in the breast, and is able to detect this more easily in woman over the age of 40. Prior to this age, the density of the tissue is too high for the mammography to detect structural change. However, thermal scanning can pick up early signs of potential pathology by detecting vascular, lymphatic and structural change in women from the age of 18. This means an early detection of any change and this can be treated quite simply to avoid further trauma and disease. With early detection, there are considerably more treatment choices available, with a far more positive result.

The monitoring back up is excellent. It is recommended that after the first scan, another is done within 90 days, and thereafter every 6-12 months, depending on the age and history of the patient.



Post treatment scanning is recommended every two weeks. Thermography scanning is affordable

and this type of scan is easily stored.

The scanning of sportsmen has huge advantages too, for early damage to tendons and ligaments can be detected and treated before the patient become aware of it – the best preventative measure one can find.

Arthritic change shows up on the scan very clearly too. So a full body scan for anyone over 50 is an annual must. Prevention is always better than cure.

Shortly two scanning rooms will be available in Bethlehem, one in Fouriesburg and one in Clarens to start with. However, if you workoffice hours and find it difficult to get off work, call one of our trained thermographers who will visit you in your own home, either before or after work. (A travel fee will be charged.)

The scanning procedure causes no discomfort and takes approximately 20 minutes. When you call for an appointment at home the thermographer will advise you on the requirements in your home for an accurate scan.

Two qualified thermography practitioners are available for appointments from 1 March.



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



## Imperani Park Old Age Home

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"I don't know how to denote to Doris's assemblage of toys," explains Kieta. And from the hundred or so photographs one could clearly recognised the dilemma she finds herself in. Doris Jacobz is a well-travelled lady and a squirrel of note. She really doesn't know how or where this passion to collect originated but every time she returns home from her one of her numerous trips, the collection expands.

She was born in the Rhine Valley, Germany and with her parents immigrated in 1954 to Ladysmith where they settled. The children were allowed to bring only one toy and this must have been a very tough choice for the young Doris and her brother. Her choice was a porcelain doll and her brother brought his Mecki teddy, part of the Steiff collection and now part of the Doriscollection.

Margarete Steiff was born in 1847 and suffered poliomyelitis when she was 18 months old. This left her paralysed in both legs and she had a painful right arm, but she still qualified as seamstress. In 1874 she bought her own sewing machine and taught herself to operate it with her left hand by turning the machine around and operating the flywheel with her left hand.

In 1879 she stumbled upon a pattern of an elephantshaped pincushion which she sewed and the "Elefantle" became popular as a toy. Her brother, Fritz assisted and after a series of soft-toy successes, the bear was designed. A firm in the USA ordered 3 000 and the market grew. The name was changed from Mecki to Teddy, after Theodore Roosevelt.

Doris's parents bought one of these teddy bears while on one of their numerous travels as a gift for Doris's brother in celebration of the teddy's 50th birthday in 1953. The brother chose that particular bear to accompany him to South Africa in 1954.

She got married in 1963 to Robin Jacobz and they settled on a farm near Harrismith. Doris has since moved to







## Haas het nog nie hier geland nie

Oral in Suid-Afrika maar veral in die Oos-Vrystaat, is daar nog mieliemeulens wat die plaaslike bevolking, maar veral ook die bergkoninkryk van Lesotho se mense, van hulle stapelvoedsel voorsien het. Die meulens is weliswaar nie in gebruik nie, maar hulle staan nog.

Wanneer jy voor so 'n gebou te staan kom en na die hoekig gekapte klip kyk, is die verwondering groot oor wat ons voorgeslagte vermag het. Elke klip is gekap om presies in sy opening te pas. En wanneer daardie klip in sy holtetjie insink, het dit gepas.

Hierdie bouery het natuurlik nie oornag gebeur nie maar is oor jare aangepak. Tyd en haas was nie 'n faktor nie. Die bouwerk aan die meule op Beginsel (17 km oos van Clarens) het byvoorbeeld jare geduur. Nadat John Hull se eerste watermeule in die rivier weggespoel het, hier in 1920 rond, is die gebou wat vandag nog staan, opgerig en dit is om en by 1929 voltooi.

Die meulemasjinerie wat nog in die gebou gesien kan word, is eers in 1953 deur MacDonald & Forsan Milling Engineers van Johannesburg, ingevoer. Hoe die meule-binnegoed voor 1953 gelyk het, is nie seker nie, maar die bestaande ou meule is voorwaar 'n asembenemende gesig – twee verdiepings hoog en van hout gemaak. Al die glygangetjies van bo na onder is nog daar, asof dit sommer gister nog gewerk het. Daar lê nog meel op die relings, nou gemeng met 'n bietjie stof. Dis die ougoed van die tyd, en ons sal altyd wonder oor hoe dit was.

Hierdie meule het tot betreklik onlangs nog 'n volle dag se werk verrig. In die laat tagtigs is daar oorgeskakel na 'n moderner meule wat vandag nog langsaan diens doen.

So amper op die oewer van die Caledonrivier staan hierdie historiese gebou met langsaan 'n klein meuletjie wat in die behoeftes van die Lesotho-bevolking voorsien. Met dra-donkies kom hulle vanuit die berge in Lesotho oor die brug, of as die rivier nie in vloed is nie, sommer teen die sandwalle op. Dan verwyl hulle die dag by die meule in die son of skadu, na gelang van die temperatuur, en elkeen wag dat sy emmer vol gemaal word. So doen hulle dit al vir meer jare as wat enige een van ons kan onthou. Op plat klippe is blokke getrek vir Marabaraba (oftewel meul, 'n Sotho-spel wat baie soos dambord is) en daar word gespeel terwyl daar gewag word. Wanneer die geselskap lekker is en van die meulekliënte ontmoet hier mense wat hulle lanklaas gesien het, laai hulle die meel op die donkie se rug en gee hom 'n klap op die boud. Die donkie weet waar sy huis is en hy stap tydsaam daarheen. Sy baas gaan voort met gesels en kuier welwetende dat, wanneer hy by die grasdak-hut in die berge aankom, of dit nou laatmiddag of die volgende oggend is, meel en donkie daar sal wees.



# They once were pioneers

Constance Parry wrote an article on the interesting and rather unknown trek to the then Rhodesia. This article was published in the June 1967 edition of Lantern. Recently, the article was sent to InClarens by Awie Viljoen, businessman of Vereeniging who is a regular visitor to the Eastern Free State. This is an abbreviated version of Constance Parry's story of Marthinus Martin who trekked from Naudeslust, in the heart of the Brand Water Basin, Fouriesburg to Melsetter, Chimanimani, Zimbabwe.

Fame has shone its golden aura upon the names of many of Southern Africa's pioneers, yet there are some who deserve a brighter place in history than the public memory has given them.

Marthinus Martin and others tamed and civilized one of the finest areas of the continent. They suffered great hardships but never fired a shot in battle. Perhaps in the peacefulness of their stories lies the reason for their comparative obscurity.

They answered the challenge of the horizons because they loved the soil and believed that Gazaland held Earth's nearest approach to the paradisiacal stream of milk and honey.

It began with an advertisement which appeared in the Friend newspaper of Bloemfontein in January 1893. It said that Mr Joseph Bobbert, agent for the Mozambique Company, was willing to make available to Free State farmers an area of land in Portuguese East Africa near Macequece; each farm would be 3 000 morgen.

Marthinus Martin lived on Naudeslust, Fouriesburg and he and three other men formed a commission to go to Portuguese East Africa to inspect the land. They found the country of their dreams. Magnificent mountains, good grazing and clear streams. Martin and his companions, Casper Badenhorst, Cornelius du Preez and Michael A Heyns were completely won over. They applied for the permission to settle in the range of mountains popularly known as Chimanimani Mountains, watershed between Mozambique and Rhodesia. Melsetter, where they eventually settled, is on the Rhodesian side of the mountain.

Martin visited Cecil Rhodes who told Martin that he would welcome none more than a number of Dutch trekkers, for they always took their families with them. 'A woman,' said Rhodes, 'is necessary to civilize a country because – in addition to many other attributes – she influences the moral climate of any country.'

This interview ended with Rhodes assuring Martin that the rights of the trekkers, including their language, would be respected and that they had nothing to fear.

Martin was born in the Cradock distict in 1851 and moved to Fauresmith. After fighting in the Basuto War he married and settled on the farm Naudelust in the Fouriesburg district. He was elected to represent Bethlehem in the Volksraad and he built up a reputation as a tireless worker in the interests of the Afrikaner. They were puzzled by his decision to leave so much behind and face hardship, danger and a lifelong struggle.

A hundred and four people moved out of Fouriesburg on 19 April 1894. They included eight heads of families and some young bachelors, house servants, Zulu men and other families joined later.

Martin kept a diary which gives glimpses of the hardships and joys of the trek. At Kranskop, cattle disease struck and just beyond they suffered their first bereavement and left behind a child's grave bearing the name Cornelia du Preez. Near the Limpopo River, men and animals suffered the torment of thirst, but spirits were renewed in the water of the river.

Here they were joined by another family from Fouriesburg. Jan Frost and it is where one of the Frost children, aged three, disappeared. Days of search revealed a small shoe.


At Nuanetsi malaria struck and they lost Lettie Scholtz, but Johanna van Zyl recovered. Tant Hannie van Zyl was still very ill when they reached Fort Victoria, the first settlement in Rhodesia.

It was a great day for Fort Victoria when the trekkers arrived. They received them with a reception, a dance and a bisley shooting competition. The Free Staters' spirits soared when their marksmen outclassed the hosts' by more than twenty points. The happiest social was the marriage of two young members of the trek, Petronella du Preez and Johan Heyns, by the Reverend A. A. Louw, of the new Dutch Reformed Church Mission at Morgenster.

In October they reached Buffelsnek and because Martin's heart was filled with thankfulness, he decided to build a memorial there and hold a day of thanksgiving. Martin and his people outspanned finally under the great peaks of Chimanimani in the Melsetter district and braced themselves for the hardships and drudgery of pioneering.

'I have never had a moment's regret that I did not stay in the Free State and am completely satisfied – although a Pioneer's life is no easy one.' He stated

This splendid leader did not live long enough to enjoy the full fruits of his labours. He died of fever in September 1904.

## Hart van klip

Jy is op reis deur die Vrystaat en mik in 'n oostelike rigting. Die einder gly in 'n onverstoorde blou lyn in die niet verby; jou uitsig is wyd en ver. Maar iewers op die N5 naby Senekal of op die N3 naby Warden begin die gelyktes en grasvlaktes hier ruis en daar ineengly, en raak jy meteens bewus van 'n andersheid – 'n beweeglikheid in die aardkors. En, onaangekondig, begin hulle voor jou opdoem – sommige plat soos tafelberge en ander grof en sonder vaste fatsoen: die sandsteenberge van die Oos-Vrystaat. En jy voel 'n roering in jou hart.

Die sandsteen van hierdie gebergtes het ongeveer 255 miljoen jaar gelede gevorm toe Afrika en Suid-Amerika nog teen mekaar genestel het en sand van die aanliggende lande oor ons gebied gewaai het. Sandsteen bestaan dus, soos die naam eenvoudig sê, uit sand. Sand, wat deur wind of water afgeset is, saamgepers is en deur baie jare heen verhard het en uiteindelik bymekaar gehou word deur 'n natuurlike element soos silika. Die neerleggings kom in verskillende lae voor, soos wat die afsettings op verskillende tye plaasgevind het. Hierdie lae, wat beddings genoem word, kan soms met die blote oog gesien word. Die nate wat so gevorm is, vergemaklik die mynwerk, alhoewel dit uitsonderlike vaardigheid verg om dié brose klip uit die aarde te haal en te verwerk.



Sandsteen word al vir baie jare gebruik as boumateriaal. Die Uniegebou is een van die bekendste voorbeelde hiervan. Sandsteenmonumente en -gedenkstene kom algemeen voor. En alhoewel die Oos-Vrystaat allermins kan aanspraak maak op sandsteen en sandsteengeboue – sandsteen kom immers oral in Suid-Afrika voor – pryk van die mooiste natuurlike en mensgemaakte sandsteenstrukture, veral kerke, beslis in ons gebied. Kunswerke en allerlei gebruiksartikels – selfs soutpotjies – word deesdae uit sandsteen geskep.

Iets wat sonder twyfel eie aan die Oos-Vrystaat en 'n baie bekende gesig hier is, is sandsteenhoekpale. Toe plase vroeg in die 20ste eeu omhein is, het die boere, naas Wag-'n-Bietjie-hout, sandsteenpale hiervoor gebruik omdat dit so stadig verweer. En gewis, meer as 100 jaar later staan hierdie mooi bakens steeds onverstoord in wind en weer, en is hulle vir ons soos ou bekendes, 'n vastigheid, wat jou na 'n lang reis laat weet: jy's tuis.

As jy jou dus weer, op pad see toe, in die land van sandsteen bevind, stel jou aankomstyd vir 'n paar uur, selfs vir 'n dag of wat uit. Ry die Oos-Vrystaatse dorpies binne. Soek die sandsteenkerk en die oudste huise. Ry deur Golden Gate. Speel "Wie sien die eerste hoekpaal?" met jou kinders. Stop by 'n straatkunstenaar en koop 'n voëlbak van klip. Verken die pad tussen Clarens en Ficksburg. Gaan klim Harrismith se Platberg.



## Doen gerus by Janki aan

Fouriesburg, Clarens se buurdorpie aan die natuurskone Maloti-roete, huisves verskeie ondernemings wat onverwags op die toeris se pad kom lê. Janki is so 'n onderneming berig Anien Aber uit Fouriesburg

Die twee jongmense se wortels gaan ver terug in Fouriesburg se geskiedenis. David se voorouers het diep spore in dié geweste getrap en hy het hier grootgeword, skoolgegaan en getrou. Mariska is 'n (tong-in-die-kies) gemaakte Fouriesburger, wat nou al een is met die landelike vloei van sake.

Toe die oorpak-fabriek op die mark kom, het hulle dadelik belanggestel en hoewel David eintlik boer, pas hierdie besigheid so in hulle kraal en was dit nie moeilik om die leisels by die stigters van Janki oor te neem nie.

Hulle verskaf werk aan sowat 30 voltydse naaldwerksters, strykers en knippers. Elke masjien word beman en die operateur weet wat van hom of haar verwag word. Dit is meestal vroue wat ingespan word omdat werkloosheid onder vroue in die Mashaing-buurt hoogty vier.






Daar word natuurlik nie net oorpakke gemaak nie, maar ook voorskote, pette en enige ontwerp wat aan hulle voorgelê word, is beskikbaar vir waar dit ook al nodig is. Agterop 'n baadjie, op 'n sak, of dalk 'n embleem op 'n pet; gee die ontwerp en hulle sal sorg dat dit aangebring word.

Mariska laat haar lei deur haar werkers se insette. Net na Kersfees was dit baie stil en het die vrouens besluit om van die afvallappies, skouersakke te maak. Elkeen het na eie smaak sy sak ontwerp en gemaak. Mariska het knippe en knope voorsien en siedaar, die werkers bly besig en hierdie nuwe vertakking blyk boonop baie gewild te wees.

'n Ander baie gewilde item, veral onder stedelinge wat die Oos-Vrystaat aandoen, is kinder- en kleuter-oorpakkies – 'n heerlike toemaak vir hitte en beskerming noudat die winter wag. Janki is beslis 'n moet wanneer die Oos-Vrystaat op jou padkaart is.
