

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

Prince Matsika or as he is now known, Moyo Berthold, is a self-taught artist who picked up his pencils and papers at 11 years of age, and has never stopped creating. Moyo was born in 1974 in Zimbabwe and grew up with a passion for design.

"I wish to share my telling paintings for there is no



point in dying with all these pictures in my head", he explains.

He turned full time artist and his favourite passtime is to study his environment. He is inspired by the many tribal faces; as well as the flora and fauna that grace the continent of Africa. He explains that the rich diversity and abundance in tradition and cultural practice yearn to be exposed on his canvas.



Mary-Ann Pickers attended a breakfast wedding at the unique St Fort venue and brought us the story Beneath the Mushroom Rock with a twist.









# Of love and flowers

With the season of love in mind, I've been on the lookout for plants with heart-shaped leaves. One of these is the sweet-scented candle-vine (Riocreuxia torulosa) - a climber in the undergrowth of Cheche forest with flowers that resemble little candelabra. After I played around with its heart-shaped leaves on Photoshop, a perfect red heart appeared from the green foliage. The leaves are apparently boiled and eaten as a spinach, but may cause severe headaches in some partakers!

With the everlastings (Helichrysum spp) being such a confusing group of flowering plants, I've been quite relieved to come across a species with heart-shaped leaves underneath the Mushroom rocks in Golden Gate: Helichrysum hypoleucum - the only one of its kind in our region with hearth-shaped leaves. It does not seem to have a vernacular name, but I suspect something like Heartshaped Everlasting' might be appropriate. Its leaves are white-felted beneath, making them real easy to identify.

Some of the grassland orchids are known to be used in love potions by traditional healers. One of these is quite inconspicuous, since it has tiny green flowers, with the ironic name 'Devil's orchid' (Satyrium parviflorum). Apart from its love and protective charm uses it is apparently also a means to bring devastation to an unfaithful partner... the poor plant!

During the December holidays you might have spotted a sweetlyscented climber with white blossoms creeping all over the place (Clematis brachiata). Its Afrikaans vernacular name 'Lemoenbloeisels' seems to be an obvious choice, but I've always been a bit puzzled by the English folk name 'Traveller's Joy'. On PlantzAfrica, a public archive on southern African flora I found the following interesting paragraph:

"The name traveller's joy must have come about because of all its wonderful medicinal properties that were useful to the traveller in days gone by when all travel was either on foot or on horseback. Leaves packed into the shoes were used to ease blisters and aches and pains, and packed under the saddle to prevent saddle sores on horses. Fresh leaves packed into the crown of a hat in the heat kept the wearer cool and protected against the effects of the sun. A tea made of the leaves (¼ cup fresh leaves in 1 cup of boiling water, stand to draw for 5 minutes then strain and drink, sweetened with honey if desired) is not only refreshing but is used by the Xhosa, Zulu, Sotho, and Tswana to ease headaches, coughs and colds, chest ailments and abdominal upsets.."

Well, well, that seems to be good advice to a traveller in love with our beautiful valley.

## Ons groet die grotman

Andries Spies, alias Caveman, het vir baie legendes gesorg en waar die werklikheid opgehou het, het die stories eintlik eers begin. Hierdie is die laaste aflewering in ons reeks oor die kleurryke Oos-Vrystaatse karakter.

Soos wat 'n mens jou kan indink, het hy 'n sirkus nooit misgeloop nie, al was hy byna elke keer met die sirkusbase in 'n rel. Een keer het ou Pagel 'n wilde muil in die ring gehad met die gewone uitdaging, vir £50. 'n Hele paar het probeer, polisieman Moolman ook, maar dié het oor die reëling gesloeg. Caveman stap toe nader. Hy spring rats op die muil, bloots en sonder toom. Voor die muil mooi weet haak hy sy voete onder die muil se blaaie in, en toe perform die sirkusmuil wat duidelik elke toertjie in die boek ken – bokspring, skop op, steier agtertoe, probeer hom teen die reëling afskuur... en toe gaan lê die muil, met Caveman rustig bo-op.

"Klim af," sê Pagel. "Nee, ek soek die £50," sê Caveman. "Klim af," sê ou Pagel weer. Hy klim toe maar af, sonder die geld, want ou Pagel reken Andries mog nie sy voete onder die muil se blad ingehak het nie. Moolman klim toe terug oor die reëling, "Betaal of ek sluit die show," sê hy.

Sirkusbaas Boswell het in dieselfde slaggat getrap. 'n Spierpaleis met 'n eksotiese naam het wonderlike kragtoertjies gedoen op 'n houtplatform in die ring. Boswell kon nie die versoeking laat verby gaan nie, al moes hy van Caveman Spies gehoor het. Enige nie-professionele gewigopteller, nooi Boswell, kan geld verdien deur sy kragman te ewenaar. Die toeskouers roep dadelik: "Wys hom. Komaan Caveman, wys hom!"

Andries tel die gewigte sonder veel vertoon op en stoot dit bokant sy kop uit onder luide toejuiging. Hy kyk na Boswell toe hy die gewigte neersit. "Nee, jy is professioneel, Spies, ek gaan jou nie betaal nie."

Andries het die gewigte weer opgetel, weer bokant sy kop uitgestoot voor 'n jillende skare, en dit skielik hard op die grond neergegooi. Die verhogie versplinter, verfraaiings en als flenters. Andries het nooit regtig in boerdery belang gestel nie, maar dit was sy lewensbasis en die tuiste vir hom en sy gesin. Later jare het hy die plaas Swartwater naby Witsieshoek gekoop, maar het nooit ophou om na interessante en avontuurlike opsies te soek nie. 'n Mens kan jou indink dat die opwinding van delwery hom aangestaan het, eers diamante en later ook spoelgoud by Tandjiesberg. Hy en sy gesin het glo daar aangekom in sy groen Fargotrok waarvan een modderskerm met rieme vasgemaak is. 'n Ketting het oor die enjinkap gestrek om dié toe te hou. Daar het hy met spoelpanne, rolsiwwe en ander kontrêpsies fools gold, iron brights en kimberly blue weggewerk in sy soeke na die ware jakob.

Een van sy meer suksesvolle kontrepsies was 'n klou wat hy ontwerp het wat die optrek van windpomppype vergemaklik het. Met die bemarking van dié kon hy weer die wêreld vol ry, van diep in die Karoo tot ver in die noorde. Sover hy gegaan het, het hy mense geken, heelwat kragtoertjies en weddenskappe weer laat herlewe. En natuurlik het die stories stertjies gekry. Dit kon ook nie anders met Andries nie.

Van die stertjies het veel groter as die stories geword. Soos dat hy met 'n fiets Kaapstad toe is en vandaar met 'n skip Amerika toe. Dié het glo gesink en Caveman moes omtrent die helfte van die Atlantiese Oseaan deurswem om om net betyds (seker nog nat van die swem) vir 'n privaat geveg teen Joe Louis in Amerika aan te kom. Natuurlik het hy dié platgeslaan voordat hy terug is Kaapstad toe met 'n skip, weer op sy fiets geklim het en terug is plaas toe om rustig met skape te boer...

Op Kestell, waar hy 'n bekende gesig was, onthou mense hom baie goed. Andries op sy perd, 'n klompie hase wat aan die saal hang, asook 'n handbyl en mikstok, en sy windhonde agterna. Met die mikstok het hy glo slange gevang, en met die byl het hy uit die aard van die saak hout gekap as hy 'n vuur wou aan die gang kry. Maar daardie alomteenwoordige byl en mikstok het aanleiding gegee tot die verskriklikste stories, en baie bang kinders. Natuurlik was hy 'n bietjie aspris ook. Mense wat hom nie goed geken het nie, het wye draaie om hom geloop.

Andries se broerskinders Hansie en Pieter onthou 'n Kersfees op Rooisloot, waar hulle gewoon het, toe Andries die familie vermaak het met sy party trick. Andries het nege appelkoospitte en een perskepit so 'n entjie van mekaar op die stoepvloer uitgepak. Toe het hy met sy hand gevoel na die punt van sy bekken been op sy een boud en toe met dié op elke pit gaan sit. Een vir een het hy elke pit, perske ingesluit, stukkend gesit.

Anders as Simson, het Andries sy krag tot op sy oudag behou, ten spyte van sy regterhand wat so erg beginne bewe het. Dit het glo al op veertigjarige leeftyd begin as gevolg van 'n nekbesering. Maar dit was eintlik maar die begin van Parkinson se siekte. Eendag sê iemand in Cloete en Neveling se kantore iets oor sy hand wat so erg bewe. Hy het sy bewende hand glo instinktief met sy linker vasgegryp en gesê: "Dis my hand, los hom uit as hy wil bewe, anders raak jy gedonner."

Ondanks al sy eienaardighede en ekstroverte geaardheid, en sy behoefte om mense te beïndruk en te vermaak, het Andries 'n sober lewe gely. Hy het nie eintlik gedrink nie, en was 'n goeie kerkganger en gesinsman. Maar dis juis daardie showman-deel van sy geaardheid wat hom anders gemaak het. Daar word vertel dat sy broer Hans, 'n groot, fors man met 'n indrukwekkende voorkoms en geaardheid, sterker as Andries was, maar nie afgewys het nie.

Sonder die Andries Spies legendes sou die Oos-Vrystaat ongetwyfeld veel armer gewees het. En as Andries se buurman nie daardie noodlottige oggend so onverwags op Diepsloot aangekom het nie, sou hy miskien net 'n baie interessante boer gebly het. Na koffie het die buurman glo ongemaklik op 'n riempiestoel rondgeskuif en toe vir Andries die nuus gegee dat sy (Andries se) verloofde stilletjies met 'n vriend van hom getroud is en die hasepad gevat het. Die twee was glo te bang vir die gevolge as die sterke derduiwel van die verhouding sou te hore kom.

Dis toe dat Andries alles net so los en die wye wêreld invaar. Maar dit kon natuurlik ook deel van die legende gewees het...

#### Surrender Hill, die laaste veldslag 28 Julie 1900

Min geskiedskrywers het moeite gedoen om die laaste veldslag van die Anglo-Boere-oorlog in die Brandwaterkom te beskryf. Thomas Pakenham en verskeie ander geskiedskrywers praat van die slag by Retiefsnek as die laaste veldslag, maar die laaste teenstand wat gebied is, was by Slaapkrantz, of soos dit op die gedenknaald staan: die Slag van Surrender Hill.

#### Tot die bitter einde

Vir die toevallige toeris is dit baie verwarrend want Surrender Hill (waar die monumentjie langs die R711 opgerig is) is nie die Surrender Hill waar die veldslag plaasgevind het nie. Die Surrender Hill wat op die gedenknaald aangedui word, is in 'n lyn vanaf Slaapkrantz, sowat 20 km vanaf Clarens op die Fouriesburgpad, in 'n noordoostelike rigting na die die Rooiberge, wat die hoefyster van die Brandwaterkom vorm. Hier het ten minste sewe Britte gesneuwel.

Op die gedenknaald, wat vir hulle opgerig is, lees ons sewe name maar daar kon meer gewees het. Die oorspronklike sandsteengedenknaald is eers ná die vrede in 1902 opgerig met die name wat toe bekend was. Op die naald staan 'for King and Empire'. Koningin Victoria het regeer tydens die veldslag en is in 1901 oorlede, sowat 'n jaar na die veldslag en 'n jaar voor die vrede. Sou die Naald toe opgerig gewees het, sou dit 'for Queen and Empire' gelees het. Ons kan dus aflei dat die gedenknaald eers ná die oorlog opgerig is. Diè feit is onlangs bevestig deur navorsing van 'n nasaat van die Britse bevelvoerder wat die aanval gelei het.


Die gebeure in die Brandwaterkom daardie ysige Juliemaand in 1900, is redelik goed bekend.


Die Britte het die Boerekommando's geleidelik in 'n hoek (van die hoefyster) begin vasdruk met die uitgange wat gou geblokkeer was: Naauwpoortnek (by Clarens) en Retiefsnek (by Slabberts). Generaals Hunter en Rundle ruk op, verby Fouriesburg na Naauwpoort (vandag Clarens). Die Royal Irish Regiment verloor twee manne, Leinster-regiment twee, Scotts Guards een en Wiltshire twee.

Die Britse bevelvoerder was aan die voorpunt van die kolonne wat vanaf Retiefsnek naby Slabberts opgeruk het in die rigting wat vandag Clarens is. Hy is gestuur om die vleuel onder sy bevel uit te sprei en die Boere af te sny van die uitgang na Naauwpoortsnek. Op die plaas wat later Dunelm hernoem sou word maar toe nog deel van Slaapkranz was, het die Britte hulle in bitter teenstand vasgeloop.

'n Handjievol Boere was op die rug van 'n lang berg ingegrawe en het die Kakies van ver af dopgehou. Soos die Boere se gewoonte was, het hulle die aankomende aanvallers kans gegee om behoorlik binne trefafstand te kom. Die handvol burgers van die Ladybrand-, Ficksburg-Smithfielden Bethulie-kommando het geweet dat dit 'n onbegonne taak was. Gerugte dat kommandant Prinsloo wou oorgee, het hulle reeds bereik.

Hulle het geweet, na dese sal daar geen keer wees nie en hulle het gewag totdat die Britte teen die kranse aan die oorkant





begin afsak voor hulle losbrand. Daar was geen skuiling nie. Die paar bossies en los klippe was net nie genoeg nie. Inderhaas word klippe gestapel om as skans te dien. En daar moes hulle sit, want wanneer hulle verskuif, het die koeëls gefluit.

Die Boere op die berg hou die magtige Britse oorlogmasjien 'n hele dag lank besig. Tevergeefs maar darem. Dit was snerpend koud en teen die aand het dit liggies begin sneeu. Ná sononder het die Boere hul plekke verlaat en te perd gevlug om die slagyster wat die Brandwaterkom geword het, te probeer ontsnap.

Kaptein John G. Dixon, bevelvoerder van die flank wat hulle hier vasgeloop het, het gehelp om die gewondes af te voer na die hospitaal in Fouriesburg. Die gesneuweldes word in 'n massagraf begrawe en net sewe se name word agterna onthou.

In Kaptein John Dixon se gemoed het dit behoorlik gewoel. Na die veldslag beraam hy planne om na die oorlog vir sy dapper makkers wat hier gesterf het, 'n behoorlike laaste rusplek op te rig. Wat hy in die hitte van die stryd nie geweet het nie, was dat hy teen sy toekomstige eggenote se broers geveg het. Toe dit na die oorlog aan die lig kom, het hy sy vaste voorneme bevestig met 'n eed om ten minste 'n deel van Slaapkranz, sy eie te maak.


Ná die oorlog keer hy terug na waar sy makkers so dapper geveg en verloor maar ook oorwin het, en na lang onderhandelinge word die koopdokumente onderteken. 'n Gedeelte van Slaapkranz en Surrender Hill, die plaas, behoort nou aan hom en hy noem dit Dunelm na sy geboortegrond, Durham in Skotland.

Hy laat 'n gedenknaald oprig met die name van die gesneuweldes daarop. Vir meer as 'n honderd jaar sou die name in sandsteen geskryf staan, maar het helaas verweer. Danksy die Raad van Nasionale Gedenkwaardighede, word 'n marmerblad met die name daarop in 1987 ingewy. So word kaptein Dixon se herinneringe vir die nageslag bewaar.

Daar is nou 'n staproete uitgelê oor die slagveld na die monumentjie wat maklik in 'n dag gedoen kan word.



Die eerste Surrender Hill-marathon is in 1994 aangebied en die wegspring was in Fouriesburg maar omdat die organisasie van 'n twee-dorp-marathon so 'n kopseer is, is besluit om dit na 'n sirkelroete te verander en in Clarens weg te spring. Die Protea Hotel in die hoofstraat sal weer eens die wegspringplek wees.

Die mansrekordhouer is tot vandag toe onbekend, hoewel hulle 'n tyd aan die onbekende atleet kan koppel. Hy het die 42 moordende kilometers in 2 uur 33 minute en 35 sekondes kafgedraf. Dit was in 1999 en die damesrekordhouer is nie ver agter nie. Louisa Lebello het die vinnigste tyd van 2 uur 52 minute en 19 sekondes in 2004 opgestel. Dan kan 'n mens skaars verstaan waarom dit 'n gesukkel is om in vyf uur klaar te maak. Maar die wat weet gee aan alle voornemende atlete die versekering: maak klaar binne vyf uur en jy is 'n wenner. 'n Wenner in die berge van die Oos-Vrystaat.





The sound of the name invokes images of colonial indulgence, and such images are becoming of a cruise on the White Mischief, the only floating cigar bar in Africa.



Gavin Boy, manager of the White Mischief, told InClarens that the boat was purpose built for the Katse Dam in Lesotho as a cruiser, and was launched in January 2002 as the Mashai for its maiden voyage from the inlet tower to the dam wall, a distance of 50 km. The boat was originally named after the proposed final and largest dam to be constructed in Lesotho.

"Due to permit delays and lack of commitment by the Lesotho Highlands Development Authority, it was brought back to Ficksburg, where the Meulspruit Dam became its new home," says Gavin.

In January 2003, the boat was re-launched on the Meulspruit Dam, as a sundowner cruise boat, named The Leopard Express after a 90kg male leopard that was captured in the reserve after it had eaten calves in the area.

Gavin came on board In July 2003, and ran a new marketing concept, involving a cigar bar and restaurant. The re-vamp was completed and on 11 October 2003 the White Mischief was launched as Africa's first floating cigar bar and restaurant.

The name White Mischief and the concept were adapted from the 1987 movie that is set in Kenya just before the beginning of World War II when the rich from England were living lavishly in the so-called Happy Valley in Kenya – unaffected by the war.

The luxury three-and-a-half-hour cruise along the Meulspruit offers beautiful scenery and runs through Thaba Sediba, a private game reserve where passengers disembark for some game viewing. This reserve has more than 15 species of animals and over 100 species of birds have been spotted here. From the White Mischief, one can see fish eagles, goliath herons and malachite kingfishers along the banks.

At the halfway-mark, passengers disembark where they enjoy a delicious gourmet meal, before going on the return leg of this leisurely cruise.



Die gesels en gelag van die uitgelate gehoor hou plotseling op toe die klanksisteem ons met 'n allemintige knal onkant vang. Terwyl almal na etlike sekondes verlig begin terugsak in hulle stoele en die geklets hervat, kom maak die klankman verskoning – dit was weens die swaar weer en nie 'n fout met hulle toerusting nie. 'n Paar koppe draai in die rigting van die vensters. In die skuur op Verkykerskop wat Matt Hoffmanen Beth Hillary gebou en vindingryk in 'n konsertsaal en partytjieplek omskep het, was ons skaars bewus van die storm wat intussen begin opsteek het. Die lug is inderdaad persgrys en broeiend, en, soos die luim van die konsertgangers, gelaai met afwagting. Ons is gereed vir partytjie hou, ons wag die nuwe jaar in, en ons wag op die kunstenaar van die aand, Chris Chameleon.

Die program begin met die jong Surisna Gouws, 'n plaasmeisie van om die draai, pas matriek geskryf. Haar oë blink en sy sing pragtig. Die storm het klaarblyklik intussen gewoed en bedaar, want toe ek my Filippynse vriendin, wie se plek oorkant ons nog leeg is, per SMS vra: "Where are you?", kom die antwoord: "We're stopping to take pictures!". En ek kan my die landskap op pad hierheen goed voorstel -poele water wat trillend van die laaste reëndruppels die berge herhaal; vars groen somergras, ineens gloeiend in die strale van die ondergaande son wat plek-plek agter die wolke begin deurslaan; dalk 'n reënboog wat uit die grasvlaktes opspring.

Chris en sy kitaar neem uiteindelik hulle plekke op die verhoog in. Ons blikborde is leeg geëet, bokse doughnuts is omgestuur. Die aand is soos Chris se musiek: oorspronklik, onverwags, aweregs, verrassend. Die saal, wat uit sy nate bars, is kosmopolitaans gevul: Boere, Souties, Kapenaars, Gautengers, Nederlanders, Australiërs, en natuurlik die Filippynse gesin wat saam met ons daar is en agterna uitvra oor die Afrikaanse grappies waarmee Chris die res van ons laat lê het van die lag. Hy sing wat ons wil hoor, glip onvoorbereid en foutloos oor van een lied na die volgende. Borsverkoue ten spyt, bewys hy hom opnuut as meer as net meesterlike toonsetter van Jonker-verse, liedjieskrywer en sanger; hy is 'n stemkunstenaar. En, na die encore, moet ons hom eindelik onwillig laat gaan, na sy tuiste 'n paar kilometer verder. Dis 'n uur of wat voor middernag.

Buite is dit, getrou aan hierdie veranderlike klimaat, na 'n hetige dag, yskoud. Groepies mense staan rond by vure. 'n Paar moedige vriende probeer 'n Chinese lantern lanseer, maar die fris nagtelike bries onderskep hulle plan. Dié met kinders begin groet en ry. In die saal is die tafels en stoele opsy geskuif en het die musiek intussen van bonserige Afrikaans na hupse klubmusiek oorgeslaan. Die pretlustiges begin binne saamdrom.

En dan is dit twaalfuur. En iewers op die Vrystaatse vlaktes, in 'n plekkie te klein om 'n dorpie genoem te word, tussen die koöperasie, die stilte van die veld en 'n paar sandsteenkoppe, word die begin van die jaar 2012 deur 'n saal vol stemme van heinde en verre toegejuig. En die stowwerigheid op die vloer begin padgee onder die ritme van stampende en skuiwende en skoffelende voete. Want Afrikaners en die hele wêreld is plesierig, en as jy hou van partytjie, vind jy dit straks op die onverwagste plek!

Kort na drieuur op Nuwejaarsoggend slenter ons uiteindelik die paar meter van die saal af na ons gastehuis toe, oor die smal R722 wat nou soos 'n swart rivier deur Verkykerskop loop. Op die stoepie omhul die stilte ons. Die oorblywende lantern vind sy weg die wolklose naghemel in.



#### A classical Free State farm

The R711 between Clarens and Fouriesburg is renowned as a scenic drive. Certainly one of the best in the Free State and it also has turn-offs that lead the curious tourist to various interesting little discoveries. One of these discoveries is the quaint cottages on a tract of land that was known as Kromdraai, but today is fondly called the Barbet.


The Barbet Country Cottages are situated 17 km from Clarens just off the R711 and in a little corner at the foot of a mountain overlooking the majestic Maluti Mountains.

When one pulls up in the parking lot, it could be just another farm in the area: two friendly Labradors greet the visitors and geese waddle to the back of the main house to get fed. The sun peeks behind the mountain and tall Lombardy trees bend softly in the breeze. The barbets are picking a fight with other feathered inhabitants in the top of the tree. Yes, the Barbet could easily be mistaken for Grandma's warm home all those years ago and the absolute peace and tranquillity is truly the Barbet's main attraction.

There is a choice between a six-sleeper (three bedrooms), partly under thatch, offering a cosy sunroom with a fireplace; two bedrooms with double beds; and one bedroom with two single beds. The cottage has a fully equipped kitchen with stove, fridge/freezer, microwave oven, toaster and kettle; as well as two bathrooms. All the beds have electric blankets and all linen and towels are supplied. The cottage is serviced daily.

The Barbet Nest, the second cottage, is a romantic two-bedroom cottage nestled under thatch with an open-plan kitchen. The main bedroom has a double bed and the second bedroom two single beds. The cottage has its own private veranda. The kitchen and lounge areas are fitted with underfloor heating and a braai area is also situated at the cottage with wood supplied on request.






# Country Cottages

### Through the eye of the master...

Accomplished photographer Noel Hutton discusses three of his many exquisite photographs.

Having been a regular visitor to the Eastern Freestate for a number of years, with the main intent to capture great photographic images and memories, I have accumulated a considerable number of what I consider to be worthwhile and memorable photographs. Of these photographs, some stand out from the rest not only because of particular merits and qualities, but also by the how and why they were captured.

The Clarens/Fouriesburg/Golden Gate region is world famous for its visual splendour. The combination of strong topographical features, big skies and a variety of pastoral elements ensure that any photographer, accomplished or not, with a little effort will capture great images. In particular, the Lombardy Poplar Trees that define the region will always provide an infinite variety of ways to be photographed – either on their own or within a much larger landscape. Being effectively "man-made" the pastoral landscapes that include trees do have a regimented appearance; none more so than those including the rows and colonnades of poplars, oaks, blue-gums, willows and many other planted species of trees.

The rows of trees can be photographed in various ways and I have selected three particular and very divergent images of rows of trees. None of these photographs are abstracted, nor do they detail any particular tree in isolation. However, they do present very divergent moods, and are samples of how the landscapes in the region present themselves and can be captured.

The first image is of the famous row of partially submerged (dead) poplar trees that are to be found within the small dam located some 3 km to the east of Fouriesburg along the R711(Maloti Route). This was photographed in the first rays of a crisp May morning. It is an image that virtually anyone who is driving on the roadway can manage. The exact location from where the photograph was taken, was very close to the roadway. The technical challenges to achieve such an image are not great; however, the combination of elements, including a

number of bird species, ensures a unique photograph. The early morning calm is offset by the strident contrast in colour and lighting, as well as the staccato effect that the dead trees' branches create. Being located in a small valley surrounded by steep sloped hills, the broken light adds to this contrast, and although not directly evident (due to the use of a short telephoto lens narrowing the angle of view), this broken light does inform the viewer that the dam is surrounded by varied topography. Further to this contrast is the fact that the warmth depicted in the photograph is a visual lie. It was very cold at the dam that morning.

The second image is of a row of willow trees that define the boundary between two pastures of a farm located off the R711. As can be seen from the large sky, the sun was still below the horizon, creating a subtle silhouetted image that contains very little detail. The main subject matter is contained in the lower quarter of the photograph. Therefore, the sky is the key element to the photograph. Such a photograph requires the photographer to be in place well before sunrise, which means that the area should be scouted prior to the day. The low light in this example, determined that a lengthy exposure had to be made and in combination with a telephoto lens, my trusty tripod was a must. The limited information, coupled with the serene mood of the photograph, confronts the viewer with both a simple image as well as one that requires some interpretation and understanding before it becomes entirely apparent. The willow trees are identifiable, they are set within a landscape that is pastoral in nature, and the time of day is very early pre-sunrise. The lack of detail, however, does ensure that not all of this is immediately apparent.

The third image is of a commanding row of poplars resplendent in their autumnal colours. This was taken in relatively harsh afternoon light some distance off the R712 roadway near the Golden Gate nature reserve. The vertical colonnade effect is enhanced by the repetitive horizontal shadow patterns. The strong geometry (supplemented by a dominant disappearing point) further lends credence to this sense of order. As can be gleaned from the light, this was taken at a time when shutter speeds would have been quite high. As a result there was no need for a tripod (although many die-hard purists do advocate tripod use as a permanent requirement to

assist with composition and horizon alignment), and my hand held effort was further assisted by the fact that I used a wide-angle lens. The clear skies and bright colours were accentuated by the use of a polarising filter. This further adds to the clarity manifest in the overall image.

The three photographs that have been described are a very small cross section of those that I have captured in the region. Although the three have a common thread (all three being of a row of trees set in a farming landscape), three very divergent images were realised, due to a variety of elements; those being time of day, quality of light and technique used. The immense (one can say infinite) number of photographic opportunities that the region presents ensures that any number of approaches to photographing the area can be taken and that the end results will always be both extremely varied and ultimately rewarding. It is for this reason that I will continue my photographic pilgrimage in the Eastern Free State region.

Currently, Suzé is the owner of CherryInk Permanent Make-Up and Skin Needling Specialists and the only therapist certified to train under Susan Church's Association in South Africa and offers skin needling training as well as doing treatments in skin needling herself.

"Using a sterile needle grouping, the technician gently inserts it into the epidermis and top layer of the dermis, signalling the brain to send collagen to the injured site for repair. This signal creates an abundance of collagen, thus plumping up the injured area and creating a softer, subtler appearance of wrinkles, acne scars and other depressed areas," Suzé explains.

She shows pictures on which early improvements can be clearly seen. Suzé says the number of treatment sessions required, varies according to the depth of each wrinkle or scar. "Improvement in the needled areas may be seen as soon as a few weeks even days after a procedure. However, inner healing of the skin continues for several months."





It is during this time that the needled skin will smooth and tighten as collagen is deposited. Fine lines or wrinkles may need one to two sessions to be plumped. Medium to deeper wrinkles and acne scars may require three or more treatments for optimal results. Pitted scars and deep wrinkles may require four to six sessions for optimum depth improvement. Results can be enhanced and maintained when special vitamin creams are used after initial healing. Needling can also be combined with other treatments including Botox, microdermabrasion, peels, and traditional surgical procedures.

No one wants to die young and aging needn't be synonymous with wrinkles, lines and furrows. It is now possible to live the rest of your life with fewer wrinkles and meet your Maker with a sweet and glowing face. And wise as an owl.

And the taste combinations at McKinley Chocolates are audacious, to say the least. What about trying their Southof-the-Border chilli in a chocolate ganache?


