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




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

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Vast is the blue African sky

After months of trying, Mary-ann Pickers was eventually granted an interview with renowned artist Johan Smith. Despite her best efforts to prepare for the interview, she couldn't find any information on the renowned artist, other than the very basic. Maryann knew there had to be more to know about the man than where he was born and how he became an artist – and she was not disappointed. She shared her experience with us.

Not only does Johan possess a unique and very rare talent for painting and pottery, he is also a people's person - open and friendly to everyone who crosses his path. He's neither arrogant nor overmodest and this beloved artist of the Windmill Centre, Clarens, relates his life story factually and without ado.

Johan Smith makes no secret of being a man of God and this became evident within minutes after we had started our conversation. He answered to the call and became a minister after having achieved everything he could in the artist's milieu.

In the late eighties, Johan's paintings were on exhibition in a rather obscure little gallery where the Street Caffé is situated today. This suited the young, unknown artist. A little later he moved to The Gallery and when his art became sought after, Johan realised that he was blessed with a rare talent and that he had to expand and open his own gallery. He quit his job in 1995 and became a professional artist. At that time, he also ventured into the property market and acquired two stands, which he sold soon afterwards at a reasonable profit and was able to buy what today is the Windmill Centre.

Life treated him well. He was a successful artist, happily married and he had beautiful and talented children. Yet he wanted more. He wanted to convey his gratitude and he answered to the calling that led him to the ministry. After he decided to follow the road that was pointed out to him, a subtle but distinctive change in his work followed. His work became more and more realistic.

The large open blue skies and smaller images on the horizon became characteristic of Johan



Smith's work. These spaces were created to allow

the Entity to enter his paintings. Johan subconsciously painted even wider horizons, decreasing the size of the objects in his paintings and opened up the blue skies for what he experienced as God's

canvass.

Born in Zimbabwe, Johan studied agriculture at Stellenbosch University. He was transferred to Bethlehem where he started with pottery and later on experimented with watercolours and then with oils.

The use of lines dominates his work and his landscapes are always stripped of detail and pretension, resulting in an uncomplicated, graphic interpretation. Subjects include landscapes, flowers and to a lesser extent people. These days, he works in oil, watercolours and pastel. Johan, being self-taught, has developed a very unique style. Thin application of paint gives a translucent air brush effect which contrasts well with thick palette knife work. Scratching through the paint creates perspective and texture.


His interest in photography and love of nature serve as his main source of inspiration. His landscapes are uncomplicated, with little or no detail, resulting in a naive and quiet interpretation of our vast African

sky. In contrast, Johan's florals are colourful, prolific and abundant.

He has received widespread recognition for his art and in February 1998 the Gencor Gallery (RAU) invited him to show his work. Paintings of the artist have also been included in a number of public and corporate collections (SAA, RAU, Telcom, BOE Head Office, Free State Technicon Hotel School, Central East Agricultural Co-op). Johan's positive outlook on life, strong Christian beliefs and the support of his wife, Stienie, and their three sons, Lou, Sebastian and David, have enabled this artist to make good progress in his career as a professional artist in a relatively short period.

Johan's works are on display at his Johan Smith Gallery, Windmill Centre, Main Street, Clarens.





Gerugte oor 'n nuwe dam in Lesotho loop dik in die Oos-Vrystaat. Nadat navraag gedoen is by die een persoon wat sekerlik die meeste van die onderwerp af weet, pak ons kaart en GPS, piekniekmandjie en koffie en vlieg weg op dit wat vir ons maar 'n dagreis heen en terug is, op soek na die dam.

Sommer vroeg reeds is ons deur die grenspos by Caledoonspoort en vat die pad na Afriski en Oxbow. Dit gaan maklik deur die buitewyke van Butha Buthe en, ywerige fotograaf wat ek is, raak ek algaande al meer opgewonde oor die mooi lig op die berge. Dit is effens bewolk en die son breek plek-plek deur om die spitse in wasige blou te tooi. Maar ons is nie hier vir foto's nie, ons soek die plek waar 'n nuwe dam gebou gaan word. Daar sal ek genoeg foto's kan neem en ons ry so vinnig as moontlik om nog vroeg genoeg te wees.

Ons is deur en oor die eerste pas en nog later verby Oxbow en nog later blink die skihang van Afriski in skrille kontras met die goue winterlandskap.

Die effense wolkies wat die oggendlig so aanloklik gemaak het, is aangejaag deur 'n weste wind wat al sterker waai. Die pad word al slegter totdat die slaggat-teerpad oorgaan in 'n baie los gruispad.

Natuurlik neem ons spoed af en alhoewel dit nog relatief vroeg is, vestig die wete langsaam in my gemoed dat nie eers die wonderlike landskap van Lesotho sal kan vergoed vir die harde lig wat al harder word nie.

Ons is net verby Letseng-diamantmyn, toe die weste wind regtig verwoed raak. Hier bo in die berge waar niks hom keer nie, tier die wind. Die kilometers op die GPS word al minder na Mokhotlong toe en ons uitkyk begin na waar ons beduie is.

Senqu-rivier, lees ons op een van die bordjies. Ja, ons moet naby wees en my oog vang die horlosie en meteens weet ek dat ek sal moet uithaal as ek enigsins 'n ordentlike foto wil neem. Die lug is dynserig en vol stof, die normaalweg mooi berge net 'n vae golwing in die verte. My moed loop al by my Hi Tecs uit. Fotogeleenthede is hier nie eers amper nie en ons het nog nie die plek van die nuwe dam gekry nie.

Ons stop by 'n uitkykpunt naby Mokhotlong om foto's te neem. Die wind neem my wind sommer met die oopmaakslag uit my seile. Yskoud, stowwerig en hier hoog sneller as 'n sneltrein. Ek staal my en maak die driepoot staan. Daar doer onder vloei 'n stadige Senqu, hierbo waai 'n vinnige westewind. Ek neem foto's maar kan net nie opgewonde raak nie. Hier is nie wenfoto's nie en ons kry ook nie die presiese plek van die dam nie.

Ons onderskep die hoof van die Lesotho-polisie wat 'n minister moet begelei na iewers en vra of hy weet. Hy is so angstig om ons uit die pad van die minister te hou dat hy nie mooi luister na ons vraag en ons dit nie regtig antwoord nie. Daar is Katse-borde en dit is mos 'n dam en hy stuur ons in ons spoor terug na Mapholeng waar daar ook riviere is. In die dorpie vra ons weer of iemand van die nuwe dam weet en ja, beduie een ons, daar by die junction, regs en so vyftien kilometer verder werk hulle aan die nuwe dam.


So gehoor, so gemaak en ons ry met 'n geboude maar growwe gruispad in die rigting van Thaba Tseka en Katse. Ons gesels nie meer nie en die mooi landskap word verdof deur laag op laag stof. Die lug is bruin, die veld is goudbruin en die tolbosse tollende ligbruin speke oor 'n dorre, bruin, laslappie-aarde. Alles bruin monochroom. Elke skerp es en elke mini-pas laat die hoop opvlam dat ons op die asemrowende gesig gaan afkom, maar daar is niks nie. Tot die GPS gooi handdoek in met 'n vraagteken oor waar ons op aarde bevind en steeds kronkel die pad 'n geel streep oor die einder.


Nou maar die kaart uithaal en ons kom tot die skokkende ontdekking dat die pad ons dalk nie by Katse of Thaba Tseka gaan bring nie. Die kaart dui aan dat die pad halfpad eindig! Die kaart is dalk oud, dié pad lyk nie of hy sommer in die middel van nêrens eindig nie; maar die kans vat? Nee, omdraai en verder gaan soek. Ons sien riviere maar beslis nie die Senqu nie en ook nie een wat naastenby genoeg water het om 'n dam te regverdig nie.

Terug by die grootpad en uit tussen die valleie maak die wind amok. Dit is nie nodig om die besluit te verwoord nie. Asof vanself, draai die voertuig in die rigting van die myn en die huis. Dit is al ná twee en teleurgesteld, moeg en honger hou ons by 'n uitkykpunt stil om te eet.

Die wind en stof en die 450 kilometer in nege uur het ons opgewondenheid getemper. Die nuwe dam het ons nie gekry nie en die foto's rus nou meestal in die herwinningsboks.

Die stories is volop

'n Man so uit die grot uit. Andries span sy talente in. Hoe was hy nou eintlik?

In die vorige aflewering in die reeks het Andries Spies, alias Caveman, die Oos-Vrystaatse kragman, sy staal in Europa gewys en in hierdie deel vermaak en verskrik hy hier te lande.

In Grahamstad vir 'n rofstoei-geveg, wed Andries 'n afslaer, ene King dat hy 'n sak mielies met sy tande, sonder om te rus, oor die plein voor die katedraal kan dra. Dit was in die dae toe 'n sak nog 200 lb (91 kg) geweeg het. Hy doen dit toe maklik en skenk die sak aan Kinderwelsyn, wat King hom toe nadoen.

Die petalje was natuurlik nie om dowe neute nie, dit was 'n uitstekende promosie vir sy geveg daar, en het nog 'n Caveman-storie geword wat die legende laat groei het. Heelparty legendes het met sy reise bygekom. Hy kon glo met sy kaal vuis 'n gat in 'n verweerde sinkplaat slaat, of dwarsdeur 'n sak koekmeel.

Laasgenoemde episode het hom by Chodos op Harrismith afgespeel. Soos dikwels gebeur het, het iemand weer met hom gekarring oor hoe sterk hy nou eintlik is, en of die of daai storie waar is.

Goed ek sal jou wys, was sy tipiese reaksie. Vir £10 sal ek 'n gat deur 'n meelsak slaan. Twee gewillige ouens hou die sakkie koekmeel vas, Andries trek los en die hele toonbank lê vol fyn meel.

Andries het mense sy lewe lank vermaak met aardighede wat met sy krag te doen gehad het. Hy het 'n voorliefde vir poetse gehad en kon 'n uitdaging, en veral 'n weddenskap glad nie ignoreer nie. Daarvoor het sy kompeterende geaardheid gesorg.

In 1936 word hy gewed dat hy nie van Harrismith af Kaapstad toe kan stap in minder as negentig dae nie. Hy aanvaar die uitdaging sonder voorbehoud en stap dit in 73 dae, 'n gemiddeld van 28 myl per dag in wind en weer. Dit het hy gedoen vir £75.

Andries het in die veertiger jare weer op Diepsloot beginne boer. Getrou en kinders grootgemaak, maar rusteloos gebly, sy kleurvolle persoonlikheid was so kontrasterend soos 'n verkleurmannetjie.

As hy in die omgewing was kon jy jou maar regmaak vir die ongewone, opwinding en avontuur. Nog 'n aspek van hom wat kort-kort opduik is sy buitengewone verhouding met diere. As dit nie graatjiemeerkaaie was nie,

was dit jakkalse, of slange, of honde. En tog kon hy na bewering ook soms die eienaardigste goed doen.

Hy het hom glo eenkeer vererg vir 'n balhorige muil, en het dié glo met die vuis tussen die oë geslaan, morsdood in sy vier spore. Op 'n ander keer het hy glo 'n rol doringdraad aan 'n perd se stert vasgemaak wat 'n vreeslike petalje afgegee het. En hy het selfs glo per geleentheid voor getuies 'n hond se oor afgesny.

Die probleem met Andries is dat die legende veel groter was as die werklikheid. Die waarskynlikheid dat bogenoemde gevalle wel kon plaasgevind het, is dus veel kleiner as die alternatiewe moontlikheid. Sy liefde vir perde en honde, en diere in die algemeen, was heeltemal teenstrydig met hierdie optrede, soos in Piet de Jager se storie:

In dié tyd boer Piet tussen Clarens en Kestell. Eendag kom 'n kêrel op 'n muil by hom aangery. Hy ry die muil bloots en daar's net 'n riem deur die dier se bek.

- "Ek is Anneries Spies" sê hy, "maar die mense noem my Caveman." "Ja," sê Piet, "ek het al baie van jou gehoor."
- "Ek wil my muil by jou los, man, ek wil gaan jakkalse jag hier agter julle in die Rooiberge in."
- "Met wat?" vra Piet verbaas, "jy het dan niks by jou nie."
- "Met jou honde, en met die bure s'n," hoor Piet nog meer verbaas. Kyk dít wil hy darem sien.

Andries het glo net so 'n bietjie met die honde gespeel, en toe fluit hy vir hulle. Die honde is gedwee saam daar weg. Kerneels Bokpoort se honde het ook bygekom, en van die ander bure s'n ook. Andries is net met vuurhoutjies en sout, en die honde daar weg. 'n Dag gaan verby, later drie, later 'n week, sonder enige teken van Andries of die honde.

Na twee weke is hy terug. Die honde spekvet, en hy met so 'n lekker dik bondel jakkalssterte oor die blad. Hy het die jakkalse vir die honde gebraai, sê hy. Destyds is 'n man deur die staat betaal om ongediertes te bestry -met sestien jakkalssterte kon hy dus 'n stewige eis indien.

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
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














When the town became a tourism Mecca, a criminal element soon saw it as a potential preying ground. With tourists flocking to the charming town and a carnival-like atmosphere prevailing over weekends, ripe pickings were there to be made!

Clarens, as other developing rural towns, experienced a surge in criminal activities in the past few years. Unemployed youths started to acting as car guards and street vendors - to the detriment and irritation of tourists who wanted to enjoy a quiet stroll through the streets.

Increasing incidents of car break-ins, house breaking and illegal hawking at parking areas became the order of the day. This led to a realisation amongst residents that drastic measures had to be taken.

The Clarens Sector Policing Forum (Sector 1) took it upon themselves to find solutions and various options were considered. The more traditional forms of civil mobilisation such as a Blockwatch system was difficult to implement due to many property owners not permanently residing in the Village and the high number of senior citizens.

With a seriously understaffed Police Station and greater priorities for the few willing policemen and women to attend to, a more innovative solution had to be found. One of the SPF committee members (an ex police Captain) suggested the deployment of Police Reservists. After due consultation with the local Station Commander and the legal section of the Cluster (remembering that Reservists are not allowed to be remunerated), a working solution was found.

Following a recruitment drive last year, four individuals (who just happened to be qualified and current Police Reservists) were employed in their private capacity by a SPF committee members in December 2010. So impressed were these benevolent employers by the civic mindedness of their new employees, that they allow them to live out their passion to spend their time on the beat on a permanent basis!

The Reservists fall under the command of the Local Police Station Commander who is sensitive to the unique situation of a Village whose income and future so heavily relies on Tourism. Hand in hand, priorities for the patrolling of the main business areas and "hotspots" in the greater Village are determined and assigned to the Reservists.

The SPF then approached the community of Clarens to help support and lessen the financial burden of the individual employers. Following positive results and with the community increasingly keener to participate, the local lawyer (who incidentally is also a SPF committee member) made his trust account available for the deposit of donations. A secure invoice system was implemented and financial propriety is ensured by an appointed treasurer.

Various big donations have been gratefully received. Last year, the Harley Davidson Club - Steel Wings, donated bicycles to the SPF to assist them in their quest to keep the Reservists mobile. Individual commercial property owners donated cash and goodwill.

Since the deployment of the Reservists the incidents of both serious and petty crimes have fallen significantly. An intelligence network was established by the Reservists and information on individual criminal elements and syndicates started flowing. Two crime syndicates were busted as a result of the reservists' close interaction and cooperation with the community and various arrests were made following break-ins at guesthouses and private homes.

Has peace and tranquillity returned to the Village of Clarens? One can never prevent crime and those intent on committing mischief. But, through a drastic increase in visible policing, and positive results in the arrest and conviction of some of the main players in the area, our hopes are up! The Village square and business area can once again be visited and browsed without harassment. We continue to patrol the streets of the Village (by night and day!) - Especially the areas known to attract the attention of criminals.

Tourists who enjoy the beauty and peacefulness on their visits often express the wish to make donations to the SPF to assist them to maintain the drive to keep Clarens the sound and safe Village it has always been. In this way development without sacrifice to security is possible and that is what the Forum has achieved in recent months.

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




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
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
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



Carp fishing also has its supporters. Like bass, carp were originally imported into South Africa, and offer an excellent challenge. They also grow to some pretty amazing sizes.


Catch and release is encouraged for both bass and carp fishing.

From divine relaxation to wild mountain rides

So, what does one do when visiting the Eastern Free State?

Simply being out in the country may be all that some of you require. If nature alone doesn't bring total tranquillity, you can be pampered at one of the many spas and wellness centres. Art lovers can linger and browse the some 25 galleries; and for the more daring, Clarens and the surrounding area offer a myriad of adventure tours and activities. This means that whether the visitor wants a relaxing vacation or heart-stopping action-packed experience, it is to be found in the heart of the beautiful Eastern Free State.

The Drakensberg and the Maluti (Maloti) Mountain range spread into valley upon green valley through the area, offering many hiking trails and bird, small-game and flora expeditions for the milder adventure seeker. Maps can be obtained at various outlets in town. Wim Wybenga is a registered field guide and can be contacted on 072 984 7482. Explore the flora that plays hide-and-seek on the mountain side.

The Snowy Hills horse trail is a two-day riding adventure that takes the rider up into the slopes of the Maluti foothills and onto the highest point on Bokpoort Farm at George's pimple, a breathtaking 2 500 meters above sea level. The horses of Bokpoort are born and bred, as well as trained in the mountainous countryside that is Bokpoort and are surefooted. These horses are suited for both the experienced and inexperienced rider. The trail package includes accommodation, stopover at the cave, meals and accredited guides. Put your life on pause at one of many mountain pools to rinse the dust from your hair and go on to walk the wild and steep mountain side back to the Bokpoort base. Snowy Hills is a two-day, Bokpoort-accommodation and trail package and a must have experience for the adventure seeker.

For the day visitor who wants to ride, Bokpoort is home to Apaloosas, Boerperd and Basotho ponies ensuring every rider the right horse to suite their experience level. More experienced riders can go for exhilarating gallops over the plains or view game and even children under six can take rides on Blackie, the horse that has introduced horse riding to many children and fostered their love for horses.

The fun and fascination never stop


A short drive from Clarens takes one up into the magnificent setting that is the Drakensberg, where, on a two-hour hike, you can climb the chain ladder and conquer the Drakensberg. Here the Tugela waterfall (at 850m the second highest waterfall in the world) tumbles in frothing splendour down the ravine and the spectacular view over the celebrated Amphitheatre and Devils Tooth holds you in awe.

On the return trip, the Basotho cultural village is where you can experience the tradition of the Basotho nation, from the ancient to the modern-day living. Meet the chief of the village, take a sip of his homebrewed beer, and be welcomed to view his village. On the way to and from the cultural village you will drive through Golden Gate National Park where you will be enthralled by the golden beauty of the sandstone cliffs.

Liphofung means "place of the eland," it was originally a San (Bushmen) shelter, later used by King Moshoeshoe I, of Lesotho and founder of the Basotho nation. It is Lesotho's southernmost National park and on a trip to this National Park, you will be introduced to the spiral aloe — the national plant of Lesotho, well protected bushmen paintings, and the local village where the people still live a simplistic life with no modern amenities. Drink some "motoho" or taste some of the best home — made bread, "madombolo." Remember your passport.

Set out on a sethuthuthu

Sethuthuthu (sound made by a motorcycle and subsequently the Sesotho word for a motorbike) tours are for nature lovers, and not for those who want to speed over obstacles at a flying pace. Slow travel is the name of the game with game viewing and it offers much more to enjoy. Before the excitement begins, you have to complete an obstacle course

with an all-terrain vehicle (quad bike) so that you can "bond" and be able to negotiate the

steep inclines and hills on the route.

These tours are thrilling with a twist. It is more than just amusement, since there's some learning in the mix. You are in the countryside, so you will learn about nature and the value it held to the pioneers who were in this area in the 1830s. Niël and Veronika van Schalkwyk will explain some of the intricacies of the sandstone

The three-hour trip is special as a sun downer cruise. Explore a piece of untamed wilderness plenty of game and real adventure!

When water travels all the way to industrial heartland


Many tourists from Johannesburg visit Clarens. When they do, they drive past one of the largest and most intricate construction projects in the world. The As River Outfall is the culmination of many decades of planning that started in 1950 when engineer Ninham Shand was contracted to determine the viability of exporting Lesotho's water to South Africa.

His findings were put on hold, but later studies on the water project were completed in 1986, when a treaty to their mutual benefit was signed between South Africa and Lesotho. This led to the largest international inter basin transfer in the world. The project was initiated not only to provide water to the industrial heartland of South Africa, but also to supply parts of Lesotho with electricity, which would add to the development of the Mountain Kingdom.


Johannesburg is the only major city in the world not situated on a large water source, and lies across the watershed dividing two river basins, the Orange (or Gariep, as it is known today), Senqu (Lesotho) to the east and Limpopo to the west. The result is that water is continually drained away from the city.

In general, the project transfers water from the upper portions of the Lesotho Highlands to the As River just outside Clarens. The Katse Dam, its wall 185 meters high, was constructed downstream of the confluence of the Bokong and Malibamatso rivers in Lesotho. A transfer tunnel of 45 kilometres was built with three tunnel-boring machines and lined with 300 mm thick concrete due to unstable basalt rock. The water from the tunnel "surfaces" at the As River Outfall, flows into Liebenbergsvlei and Saulspoort Dam near Bethlehem, past Frankfort into the Vaal Dam, from where the much needed water is supplied to Johannesburg.





Don't forget your passport when visiting Lesotho

There is a winding road through mountain creases, snowcapped peaks, unspoilt valleys and rumbling streams. This road is very close to picturesque Clarens and within reach of locals and visitors alike. Vehicle and passport are the only requirements to enter a fairy world of mountains and valleys, where horizons beg to be explored.

Follow the R711 road from Clarens to Caledonspoort, approximately 50km. Immigration officials are friendly and efficient. Entrance to Lesotho is a mere twenty rand per vehicle. At the T-junction in the town of Botha Buthe, turn right to Leribe, turn left at Leribe towards Pitseng en Lejone. After two to three hours from Clarens, you will cross a bridge over part of the spectacular Katse dam behind its 185m concrete wall, the highest in Africa.




The restaurant and Lodge at Katse Village serves delicious meals. Tours of the dam wall are also available. It is an unforgettable day trip. A real Lesotho experience.






















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

Bashful beauties of the grassland

The Orchid family is among the largest of the flowering plants with over 20 000 species worldwide. Most occur in the tropic and sub-tropic regions of the planet. It has specially designed flowers to attract specific insects for pollination. Southern Africa has a rich diversity of orchids as well that occurs mainly in the grasslands, writes field guide, Wim Wybenga this month.

November — February is the time of the year when the various grassland orchids come into bloom in the Clarens Nature Reserve. Most of these are fairly inconspicuous and you need to train your eyes to find them among the tall summer grass. I've counted about fourteen species so far in our region, but I'm sure there'll be many more if one considers the abundance mentioned in the literature. The earliest one to come into bloom in the Reserve is Eulophia clavicornis (early November) with its purplish brown sepals, white petals and purple and yellow-white lip. Like most orchids, it's used in traditional medicines as a protective charm referred to as Mammetsana in Sesotho.

My personal favourite is the sweetly scented Disa cooperi with its conspicuously long spurs that curve upwards and a triangular, green lip. The strongest fragrance is emanated just after dusk when it is pollinated by hawk moths towards the end of January. On steep sandstone inclines of the Scilla walk, the green-flowered Satyrium parvifolium with its rounded leaves is often overlooked as it's so well camouflaged. In the Afromontane forests of KwaZulu-Natal and a few secluded ravines of the Eastern Free State, a number of species also occur as epiphytes (growing on trees) or lithophytes (growing on rocks).

All orchid species are listed as protected plants in the Free State Province and are good indicators of undisturbed grasslands. The major threats to their future existence are transformation of grasslands for agriculture, urbanisation, regular veld fires, over-exploitation for traditional medicinal use and overgrazing.

Various indigenous shrubs and trees also come into flower towards the end of January, and producing their seeds. One tree that is of particular interest in terms of medicinal use is the Parsley Tree (Heteromorpha arborescens). It is fairly common in kloofs and on the edge of sandstone caves. The main use is to treat abdominal pains and intestinal worms in children by means of an infusion of leaves applied as an enema. Smoke from burnt plant material is inhaled to treat headaches and decoctions from the roots have also been used as a mild aphrodisiac. Recent research has shown that extracts from the roots display strong antimicrobial activity with various deadly bacteria and could perhaps be used to combat diseases like TB and pneumonia in future. The Parsley Tree is easily identified by its conspicuous papery bark that peels off in horizontal layers. Its inconspicuous yellow-green umbel flowers have an unpleasantly strong smell that attracts a variety of insects like flat beetles (Lycidae) that feeds on the tiny petals and in turn aids with pollination.

Node vertel sy eie droewige verhaal

Die kerkhof op Node getuig van trauma, dapperheid en geskiedenis. 'n Kerkhof is op sy beste nie 'n gelukkige plek nie maar Node se storie klink op tussen die randjies van die Oos-Vrystaat. Terwyl ons die hartseer wat oopgemaak word, respekteer, wil InClarens die verhale van die voorsate wat hierdie vallei mak gemaak het, vertel. Fotos en teks deur Amanda van Blerk

Die plaas se naam, vermoed ek, het hy nie net gekry na aanleiding van die versugting na benodigdhede nie, maar ook omdat die grond letterlik eeue in besit van die Naudé's was. Die woordspeling kan nie bloot toevallig wees nie. Volgens historiese geskrifte was daar net voor 1865 'n rampspoedige droogte wat die inwoners van die area kwaai uitgedun het, asook die wrede strooptogte deur Zoeloe-koning Tsjaka en Basoetoe-koningin Mantatisi. Die gebied was onbewoon toe die Naudé's hulle hier kom vestig het en leeus en luiperds was nog 'n wesenlike gevaar vir die veeboere van die tyd. So word Node op 15/04/1865 die eiendom van David Stephanus Naudé en met die uitsondering van Francois Paulus Naudé, tweede seun van DS, sou daar vir meer as 'n honderd jaar, 'n David Stephanus Naudé aan die roer van die Node-skip wees.

François Paulus Naudé, die enigste ander Naudé op Node is op 4 Julie 1871 gebore en trou met Maria Christina Roos. Maria se moeder sterf aan swart masels en haar vader Johannes Gysbertus Marthinus Roos, toe 74 jaar, trek by hulle op Node in. Vir die laaste 21 jaar van sy lewe sou hy deel wees van die lief en leed op Node.

Nou, JGM Roos was 'n legendariese figuur. Afkomstig van Lindley, tweede seun van die vader van die Roos-familie in die Vrystaat, C.J. Roos, trou hy met Anna Elizabeth Bruwer van die Kestell distrik en die verbinding bring mee dat hy die grootste grondeienaar van die eeu word. Hy bereik die rype ouderdom van 95 en beleef en oorleef die Anglo Boere-oorlog, asook die stigting van die klein dorpie, Clarens, aan die voet van die berg Horeb. Op sy en sy kleinseun se aandrang, word die plekkie tussen die berge, Clarens in 1912 vernoem na sy eweknie in Switserland.

Sy kleindogter Susanna Naudé skryf oor sy dapperheid die volgende:

"Hy was 'n baie dapper en onverskrokke jong man en het sy pa se lewe gered toe 'n leeu van agter op dié spring en hy die geweer in die leeu se bek druk en hom dood skiet. Hy was maar net sestien en tog kon 'n mens tot sy dood toe die merke aan sy hand sien.


In die Engelse oorlog (ABO 1899) het hy 'n koeëlskoot deur sy een long gekry en het toe reeds tydens die Basoetoe-oorlog van 1869 'n assegaai-steek in die ander long opgedoen."

Die lewe op Node het sy loop geneem. Dawie en Aletta Naudé het in die vroeë 1980's die leisels oorgeneem en hul lewens gelei in die reëlmaat van ploeg en plant, kinders versorg en skool toe ry. Soms oorbly by vriende, tennis op Saterdae en kerk toe gaan op Sondag. Dit alles tot daardie donker nag van 18 Oktober in 1990. Die moord op Dawie en sy vrou Aletta was die mees opspraakwekkende gebeurtenis wat die vallei die eeu beleef het. Nie al die droogtes of vloede of motorongelukke kon 'n gemeenskap so skud soos die dood van daardie twee mense nie. 'n Dubbele moord in die vreedsaamste deel van die platteland, was soos wakkerskrik in die nag.

Die begrafnis in die klein kerkhoffie met die sandsteenmuur was hartroerend en sou die meeste van die begrafnisgangers bybly. Die son het geskyn en almal het agter hul hande geskuil om die skerp lig en hartseer af te weer. Die lewe op Node sou nooit weer dieselfde wees nie.

Did a mermaid visit Fouriesburg?

The rock art of the Eastern Free State offers many opportunities to relate to the artists that created these exceptional pieces of evidence of their lives. One such painting near Fouriesburg has been the subject of much academic discourse and of speculation by the less informed.

Wim Wybenga tells more.

An unusual depiction of fish in a small stone shelter on the banks of the Little Caledon River seems to resemble dolphins. On closer inspection, however, taxonomists have been able to identify these fish as a species of mormyrid (bottle-nosed fish). Mormyrids are restricted to the subtropical rivers of northern KwaZulu-Natal, Swaziland, Mpumalanga and further north — hence these are depictions of a species exotic to our region. In fact, the closest river where they do occur is 300 km away. Further archaeological evidence at these sites (like seashells) suggests that the mountain Bushmen responsible for these paintings travelled to KwaZulu-Natal and traded with resident Nguni groups. One researcher actually hypothesised that they travelled on horseback (which they acquired during their raids) — that is if the paintings are less than 400 years old, but they still need to be dated.

This particular painting forms part of a cluster of similar sites further south towards Ladybrand, Eastern Cape, Lesotho and the southern KwaZulu-Natal Drakensberg. It is a unique cluster in Southern African rock art with an idiosyncratic meaning that we have yet to understand.


Fortunately, there are some clues... a clear transformation from man to half-man-half-fish (ichtyoanthrope) is depicted on the rock face. Bushmen believed that all animals contained a potency (or power) that they could utilise to transform into spirit beings able to, for instance, drive sickness away or attract game to their camp. This kind of transformation was usually associated with their trance dance rituals that would carry on for hours during the night. So one thing is certain, the resident mountain Bushmen utilised the potency of the mormyrids for some or other purpose.

Further clues lie in the actual habit of mormyrid fish: Mormyrids are able to communicate with one another, find prey, and detect predators in murky waters or at night, by using electromagnetic pulses. They are nocturnal or crepuscular (active at dawn and dusk). Some Mormyris species will even give off an electrical shock when handled. The Mountain Bushman probably observed the electromagnetic activity in mormyrids during their vast travels, and translated it as some kind of potency.

The transformation of a person into a fish and taking on its attributes clearly relates to the shamanic Bushman term 'underwater' that is so closely related to the trance dance, during which the shamans apparently travelled to the spirit world in the sky where their ancestors lived, a place that they believed existed beyond the rock face on which they painted these intricate symbols.

The Post House Restaurant has a host of homey basics and a popular breakfast. Picnic tables in a courtyard just off the village square make this a pleasant people-watching spot.




